(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, April 12.—The Canadian Army is at full strength, backed by reserves and well supported by the most efficient artillery in France, under the direction of General Morrison.

The Canadian headquarters here are confident that the Canadians will be able to retain Vimy Ridge, and that they swept over those blood drenched heights, will be marked by another decisive victory.

The Canadians are particularly anxious to emphasize to the world they have an efficient and courageous army as three years ago, when at clash at the second battle of Ypres.
