FUNERAL YESTERDAY—The remains of the late George L. Organization Of Fishermen In Maritimes

CANSO, Sept. 24—Dr. M. M. Coady of Antigonish, recently appointed by the Federal Government to organize the fishermen throughout the Maritime Provinces, opened his campaign at Canso, where he addressed a public meeting in the Ideal Theatre last night with a large audience attending.

Dr. Coady said there was a sane and rational solution to the problems facing the fisheries and fundamental truths would ultimately prevail, he said. The fishing industry is going to be a real industry, he said, and its problems he believed were easier of solution than those of the farmers, but a lot of hard work would be required.

His aim, he said, was the organization of a local union in every fishing place, and later a Maritime federation with a central body made up of the best brains in the industry.

The W. M. S. has done wonderful work at home and abroad. Among their home activities, the Redemption House in Sydney; the girls' residence in New Carlisle and the immigration work at our ports are worthy of very special mention.

The Pictou Boys' Residence has improved greatly during the year. Today it has a staff of teachers and a student body second to none in any school of the Maritime Provinces. As an educational, religious and cultural centre it will receive the hearty support of the Synod.

The report of the legal committee is intensely interesting and will form the ground for fruitful discussion. Several very interesting legal cases are before the courts; but judging from discussions already given, the Presbyterian Church has nothing to fear.

As convenor of the historical committee Mr. Muir will present the historical report to the Synod. This is a very interesting one containing a most valuable record of nearly all the churches in P. E. I. got up by Mr. John Anderson, Charlottetown, who as a member of this committee, has taken great interest in this matter. This will be preserved in the archives of the Synod.

After giving in this report Mr. Muir will leave the Synod for Montreal on invitation of the Senate of the College there to convey the greetings of the Maritime Synod to Dr. Scott MacKenzie on his installation as principal in succession to Principal D. J. Fraser, who has resigned on account of ill health.

In connection with the Synod's meeting, there are a few interesting facts which the members and adherents of the Presbyterian Church should know for inspiration and encouragement.

There are 75 ministers, 725 elders, 10,700 families, 18,000 communicants, and since the Disruption have built and brought back 56 churches costing over half a million dollars. There is a great eagerness to reclaim the church's former strength and to exceed it. There is a marvellous response everywhere surpassing anything that had ever been hoped for.

Lieut.-Governor Hertz spoke in the highest terms of the exhibits and delivered encouraging addresses in French and English, complimenting the farmers on their efforts and success and especially stressed the importance of mixed farming.

Premier A. C. Saunders, the next speaker added a high meed of praise regarding the exhibits and thought that the county exhibitions should be kept up as they did an immense amount of good.

Hon. Walter M. Lea, Minister of Agriculture gave a very interesting speech on farming and in general commended the exhibitors on their exhibition of live stock, and made special comment on the sheep which were some of the finest he had seen this year. He strongly stressed the point that the keeping of live stock is the backbone of agriculture and the only method of maintaining the fertility of the soil.

Mr. McLean, M. P., spoke in congratulatory terms of the Exhibition in general and was pleased to see so many people present.

Mr. Justice Arsenault gave an interesting speech in French, and the Honorary Vice President Rev. X. Theodore Gallant of Fifteen Point spoke briefly in the same language.

Hon. J. D. Stewart congratulated the people of Egmont Bay and Mont Carmel on the splendid success in putting on such a fine exhibition. He made special reference to the late Rev. Dr. Gauthier and the late Rev. P. P. Arsenault who were always very keenly interested in this exhibition.

The horses were judged by Mr. Jabez Lea of Victoria, and exceeded in quality those shown last year. The sucking foals in the draft and carriage classes were exceptionally good. The prizes were evenly distributed, not more than two going to any one exhibitor. The cattle were judged by Prof. W. J. Reid and W. R. Shaw and were a great improvement over last year both in quality and numbers with exceptionally good exhibits in mature classes. Special mention can be made of the showing in Ayrshires and Shorthorns. With the present line of exhibits as a foundation a marked improvement could be shown in future shows.

The chief prize winners and exhibitors were Mr. X. O. Gallant, Chryssostom in the group Ayrshires and Mr. C. M. Arsenault, Abrams Village in the group Shorthorns.

The sheep and pigs were judged by Prof. Clay and Mr. Gillis of Charlottetown. The sheep were of a very outstanding quality and there was a wonderful exhibit of market lambs. All classes showed a much better grade than in previous years. The chief prize winners were Messrs. X. O. Gallant and C. M. Arsenault.

The swine entries were well filled and the exhibitors were evenly distributed. Mr. George Lightizer, Charlottetown, judged the poultry of which there was a good showing, the Plymouth Rocks being the best represented although the best quality birds were in the White Leghorn classes. The ducks, geese and turkeys were also of very good quality.

Mr. Parent of the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, was judge of the grain, vegetables, and roots. There were no entries of wheat owing to the Exhibition being held early for the season. Oats, barley and buckwheat were of very good quality. In the root exhibits the different varieties of potatoes were very fine as were also the exhibits of mangies. In general the entries were not as many as last year but the quality was of a much higher order.

The handicraft and domestic science department was as usual a great exhibition of the skill of the industrious ladies of the district, many beautiful pieces of needlework and handsome hooked rugs being shown. The home made cooking and bottled fruits, not to mention the juicy looking apples looked very appetizing. Mrs. Kate Le Clair and Mrs. Joseph Barrault were the chief exhibitors and prize winners. The judges of the indoor exhibit were Miss Schurman and Miss MacPhail.

The Nationalist Government however is concentrating large bodies of troops along the Hupoh border, ready to meet any menace from the North.

General Ying-Ching, who on Sept. 22 said that the disbandment of the Nationalist Government troops were proceeding according to schedule resigned this afternoon.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 25—"Eggs"—There is a firmer undertone on the larger eastern markets today.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 25—The local egg market is firm. Brokers report sales of graded eggs at extras 46-47, firsts 41-42, seconds 30-31, delivered in free cases. The wholesale prices are firm and unchanged.

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 25—This egg market is holding steady and firm on fresh extras with prices unchanged on firsts and seconds. Eggs are jobbing on spot today at extras 47-48, firsts 40, seconds 30.

SAINT JOHN, N. B. Sept. 25—The egg market here continues dull and irregular with stocks moving slowly. Paying prices have been reduced slightly bringing them more in line with the reduced wholesale prices. Quotations to country shippers for ungraded eggs are now extras 45-46, firsts 37-40, seconds 29-30, cases returned.

Dominion Livestock Branch market reports, Montreal.
QUEBEC, Sept. 25—10.30 a. m. there were 90 cattle, 81 calves, 237 hogs and 2 lambs, offered for sale on the two markets. One load of fair quality steers averaging around 950 pounds brought \$8.25 and bulls were steady at \$5.25 to \$5.30. Canners were mostly \$3.50. Calves and lambs were unchanged. Hogs were stronger at 13 fed and watered. Odd sales were made on a graded basis some were from \$10.50 to \$11.00.

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 25—(Produce)—With heavy arrivals of poultry from various parts of eastern Canada, wholesale prices for live poultry were quoted today at 23 to 28 cents per pound. Dressed lines at the retail trade continued steady. Butter prices continued unchanged at 38c per pound for Eastern Townships Number 1 pasteurized in a wholesale way.

The cheese market was again unchanged at 19c to 20 cents per pound for Number 1 Ontario white. Number 1 Quebec brought 19c to 19 1/2c. The egg and potato sections were also unchanged.
