

STRONG APPEAL.

LONDON, Jan. 30—A committee of prominent British residents in Portugal formed for the purpose of investigating conditions of the thousands of political prisoners awaiting trial at Lisbon and various parts of the provinces, after examining two prisoners issued a provisional report which makes a strong appeal to the British Government for its good offices. The committee asks the Government to exert pressure on the Portuguese Government to secure fair treatment and speedy trials of persons so that numberless innocent persons arrested on mere suspicion may be liberated instead of being kept waiting for months underground in unsanitary dungeons, under conditions unspeakably filthy and degrading. According to a report it would appear that some have been incarcerated since the inauguration of the Republic.

DEATH OF DUKE OF FIFE ROYALTY IN MOURNING.
LONDON, Jan. 30—The tragic end of the Duke of Fife, ill-starred voyage to attend the consecration of the Cathedral of Khartoum, erected as a memorial to General Gordon, has given a great shock to the British people.
Although he showed no ill effects of his experiences in the wreck of the steamship Delhi on his arrival in Egypt, the Duke's death is universally attributed to the exposure and shock resulting from the event.
The Duke's death will cause a curtailment of all arrangements at the Port of London for the reception of King George and Queen Mary on their return from India. It is probable that all festivities will be shorn of military display, and that state ceremonial court functions in the early spring will also be modified.
OTTAWA, Jan. 30—The news of the death of the Duke of Fife was received at Government House last night while His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught was dressing for dinner. A large dinner party of over one hundred, owing to the lateness of the receipt of the sad news could not be postponed.
