French Treaty Is Terminated

Negotiations For Extension For Six Months Being Unsuccessful, The Treaty In Force Since 1922 Ceases To Exist. Way Now Clear For Imperial Trade Treaty.

OTTAWA, June 16. (By the Canadian Press)—The Franco-Canadian trade treaty terminated at midnight tonight. The Department of External Affairs announced late today that negotiations to have the treaty extended to the end of the year had failed.

The result will be that the French tariff on many Canadian products will be greatly increased as they are transferred from the minimum or intermediate lists to the general tariff. The commodity most affected will be wheat. Instead of a minimum of 85 cents a bushel...

MUSSOLINI PREDICTS WAR

LONDON, June 17.—(Friday)—(A.P.)—The Daily Express printed an interview with Premier Mussolini of Italy today in which he was quoted as criticizing caustically the United States and Democracy generally, adding that he foresaw a long series of economic and military wars.

"America has no policy!" the correspondent quoted him as saying bitterly and with sardonic contempt. This was in reply to a suggestion from the correspondent that the United States was "one of the life belts to which 'dealers' are clinging for salvation in the world crisis."

The correspondent suggested that the Premier had no faith in Democracy. Mussolini smiled derisively, he said, and repeated: "Democracy is nothing. The people are nothing, and can do nothing. In every country they are weary of it."

Escaped Men Surrender To Authorities

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, June 16.—Five prisoners who escaped in a small boat from Devil's Island, the French penal colony, succeeded in reaching the mainland after harrowing privations, only to be arrested at San Fernando on charges of landing without passports.

Exhausted, bruised, and near starvation, the fugitives steered their craft for Erin Village, where they obtained food and clothing. The following day the mast on their boat snapped and they drifted aimlessly until the craft was wrecked on a reef. They abandoned the boat and set out on foot for San Fernando. Footsore and hungry the men threw themselves upon the mercy of the authorities.

Late Returns Last Night Showed Gov't. With 22 Seats And Leading In 11, While Conservatives Elected Three And Were Leading In 7 — Independent And Labor One Each — Liberals Nil.

WINNIPEG, June 16.—Hon. John Bracken will be Prime Minister of Manitoba for another five years. The general election held today resulted in the return of Government candidates on a sweeping scale.

At 10.30 tonight the Government was sure of 22 seats and leading in 11 more. Three Conservatives were elected and that party was leading in 7 other seats. One Labor candidate was elected and one Independent was in the lead.

The result of the voting puts the stamp of popular approval on the recent Liberal-Progressive coalition. Col. F. G. Taylor, Conservative leader, declined to join a coalition Government when it was proposed by Premier Bracken last autumn. Tonight Col. Taylor stands elected in his own constituency of Portage La Prairie, but many of his followers went down to defeat.

Chief opposition to the Government was provided by the Conservatives who contested practically every constituency in the Province
