Thadde, who is a native of Lennox Island, is a returned hero, being wounded at one of the sharp battles, besides having one eye blown out, he received a general "breaking up." He, however, has served considerable time in a hospital where a glass eye has been substituted and where he has been so well patched up that he is now able to do any light work. He has received an honorable discharge, and his name has been put on the pension list. H.

—A GOOD THING TO REMEMBER.—There seems to be many different opinions among people as to what numbers constitute the different divisions of the army. The following explains: An army corps, 60,000 men; an infantry division 19,000 men; an infantry brigade 7,000 men; a regiment of infantry, 3,000 men; a battalion is 1,000 men; a company is 250 men; a platoon is 60 men; a corporal's squad is 11 men; a firing squad 20 men; field battery 145 men; supply train 283 men; machine gun battalion 296 men; an engineers' regiment 1,098 men, an ambulance company 66 men; a field hospital 55 men; a medic attachment, 13 men. A major-general heads the field army and each army corps; a brigadier general heads each infantry brigade; a colonel heads each regiment; a lieutenant-colonel is next in rank below a colonel; a major heads a battalion; a captain heads a company, a lieutenant heads a platoon; a sergeant is next below a lieutenant; a corporal is squad officer. H.
