COCHET MAIN-STAY OF FRENCH TEAM

 PARIS, July 24.—The burden of retaining the Davis Cup, emblem of international tennis supremacy, for France was placed squarely on the sturdy shoulders of Henri Cochet today as Jean Borotra definitely declined a singles assignment. Cochet and Andre Merlin, fourth-ranking French youngster, were named by Rene Lacoste, non-playing French captain, to carry the singles battle against the United Kingdom, conqueror of the United States in the Interzone finals. Borotra will pair with the veteran Jacques Brugnon in the doubles. Lacoste said he was confident Cochet would rise to his old heights, take both his matches and that Borotra and Brugnon, Wimbledon champions, would win the necessary third point. Lacoste also expressed confidence in the slightly-built, left-handed Merlin, saying the youngster was picked in preference to more experienced players because he "has the will to win." The same English team whose stunning and dramatic 4 to 1 defeat of Ellsworth Vines and company was still a reverberating topic today will meet the French in the challenge round Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Fred Perry and Henry W. (Bunny) Austin will play singles and Perry will join with George Patrick Hughes in doubles.

Diamond Sutra, which dates back to 868 A. D. and was found not many years ago in the cave of the Thousand Buddhas at Tun Huang in the Mongolian Desert by Sir Aurel Stein. It is now one of the chief eastern treasures in the British Museum. The invention of movable type, which in Europe is usually associated with Gutenberg, and the year 1450, in China, dates back as far as 1040 when Pi Sheng anticipated the European invention by four centuries. The subsequent course of Chinese printing was briefly sketched and the lecture ended with an explanation of the forms of Chinese books. It is interesting to note that the finest collection of Chinese books outside of China is to be found in the Gest Chinese Research Library at McGill University, where it is administered in close co-operation with the recently established Department of Chinese Studies.

IS VICTIM OF DROWNING ACCIDENT

The schooner "Grace and Lou", Capt. George C. MacBeth, of Alberton, brought the sad news to that port yesterday morning of the death by drowning at 11 a. m., on Sunday of Mr. Milo Burke, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. R. Burke, well-known residents of Alberton. The deceased was twenty one years of age and who conducted a store at Alberton, had taken a trip on business to New Brunswick by this schooner and it was while the vessel was laying at anchor off Fox Island at the mouth of the Miramichi River, waiting for a change in the wind that the young man lost his life. The only one on deck at the time, he was washing his face and is supposed to have stumbled on the deckload of lumber and thus fallen overboard.

Stresses Value Of Aviation

An interesting address on aviation, particularly with reference to a mail and passenger service between the mainland and Prince Edward Island, was given at Rotary Club yesterday by Rotarian H. G. Rogers. Mr. Rogers dealt with the subject in an informal manner, stressing the tremendous importance of aviation as a factor in the development of Canada. He made reference to the pamphlet issued by Canadian Airways which gives much interesting information about the services which they have in operation and he distributed copies of this pamphlet among the Rotarians at the luncheon.

Mr. Rogers said that since Canadian Airways Limited commenced operations in 1928 they have had only one passenger fatality and during that time have flown millions of miles. He was told that under ordinary weather conditions the flight from St. John in an ordinary plane would take two hours. The flight from Charlottetown to Moncton, a distance of about 80 miles as the plane flies would take from 35 to 50 minutes. The mail service between the Island and the mainland which was in operation during the period when the second train was not running proved to be a great boon to our people and the speaker said that every effort should be made to have this service resumed in the fall day following the discontinuance of the second train. He stated that at a meeting of the business men of Montague, Lower Montague, Georgetown and Cardigan a resolution was unanimously passed and sent to the Post Master General urging the putting on of this plane when the one train a day service to and from the mainland is started. Mr. Rogers gave a number of illustrations of the service rendered by the aeroplane in carrying sick people to the hospitals, in the saving of time for business men, and

BUILDING WILL BE CONSTRUCTED

Construction work will begin shortly on a building to be erected on the site on Queen Street of the old Brace Building, which was destroyed by fire several years ago. The building, which is to be a two-storey brick structure, will be erected by Mr. Albert T. MacKinnon, who has returned from United States to make his home here. The new building will comprise three stores and eight offices, will have a frontage of 60 feet and a depth of 70 feet, and will be so constructed that partitions can be removed without injury to the strength of the building. The lower floor will be completed after Nov. 15, and the second shortly after. The footings of the main walls will be sunk to a depth of twelve feet from the street level. All window sashes are of steel, thus rendering the windows practically burglar-proof and fire-proof. Mr. J. E. Harris is the architect.

Mr. Gallagher was a native of Newmarket, Ont., and entered the theatre business as a boy, working his way up to the position of solo vocalist and ultimately, management of variety theatres. When picture houses first came into vogue they were usually semi-private and semi-vaudeville. Mr. Gallagher received the appointment of manager of such a theatre in Ottawa and proved so successful in converting a losing proposition, into a profitable one that when the Company, which had acquired the Prince Edward Theatre, wanted a manager for it, they immediately offered him the position. That was in 1914, and Mr. Gallagher remained with the Company until the transfer of the business to Mr. F. G. Spencer, of Saint John, who retained Mr. Gallagher's services. Mr. Spencer had very high regard for Mr. Gallagher and the two worked harmoniously together for the past eighteen years, in the successful building up, not only of the Prince Edward Theatre but the Capitol Theatre as well.

Mr. Gallagher was a man of high personal probity and integrity, and enjoyed the confidence of the business community and patrons alike of the theatres. He was a splendid tenor voice, and his services were greatly in demand for many years, for concerts and similar entertainments. He was a member of the St. James Presbyterian Church and President of the choir, and took a keen interest in its affairs. He was a member of various organizations in this city and was generally esteemed as a man, ready and willing to put his services and ability at the disposal of those requiring them. The greatest sympathy will be extended to the orphaned children in their double bereavement. The funeral has been arranged for Wednesday afternoon.
