Veterans of the Turf Here for the Races

An interesting feature of this year's Exhibition horse races will be the presence on the track of the three oldest race drivers in Canada, all of whom are Maritime Province men. They are Mr. Lewis Cox, who is training the horses of Mr. C. Jackson of Maine; he is 75 years of age and has been racing and training horses for 45 years. Mr. Cox is hale and hearty and is a wonderful example of the healthfulness of horse-racing. Harry Lydiard is here from Kentville, N. S. He is one of the old timers also, is 75 years of age and has been racing horses for 51 years. His most notable success was with the stallion "Border" 2:11 1-4, which he campaigned on the Grand Circuit. Border actually trotted a mile in 2:05 1-4 with the last half in 59 seconds and but for a mishap would have been very close to the two minute list.

Twenty years ago Mr. Lydiard had accumulated 300 first moneys, which shows the prowess and skill inherent in him. Mr. Lydiard in conversation with a Guardian reporter, recalled the fact that, eleven years ago, on a Charlottetown track he lowered the Maritime record for four year olds with Border to 2:13 1-4, which stood until three years ago when Bill Sharon lowered it to 2:16 2-4. Twenty five years ago he took part in one of the most sensational races of his career also on Charlottetown track. Many horsemen will remember the famous Warren Guy, Minota and Montrose races. Lydiard drove Warren Guy, Montrose being piloted by our local, Mr. R. J. Steele. The first heat was won by Montrose in 2:20 which was the first time 2:20 was trotted on a Maritime track. He also won the second heat in the same time. Warren Guy won the fourth heat in 2:19 1-2. Minota the sixth, the race being carried over till the following day when Warren Guy won the seventh and deciding heat. The third of the trio of horsemen referred to above is our popular sportsman ex-Mayor P. S. Brown, Mr. Brown is considerably younger than the other two being, as he says himself, only a boy, and to see him driving on the track his statement would not be questioned. He is 68 years young and has been racing horses for 53 years. Br. Brown came to this province in 1877 and has been one of the leading factors in the horse racing sport ever since. Mr. R. J. Steele of this city, although not taking an active part in racing is still very keenly interested and may be seen on the race track at most every afternoon. He is considerably younger than his above named confreres with whom he has engaged in many memorable turf battles during the past.
