Outfield—A good throwing arm, speed of foot, and most important, the knack of taking a good cut at pitched ball. An outfielder must be able to space his batting average with a generous sprinkling of doubles, triples and home runs.

Infield—A good pair of hands for ground balls, a good arm to throw out runners at first base, and a fair hitting eye. Infielders are not expected to chip paint off the fences with line drives, but they must be able to make them that much more welcome.

First base—First sackers are not listed with infielders because of the vogue to have a big bruiser of the Jimmy Foxx, Jimmy Greenberg, Lou Gehrig school at the initial corner. In short, one who can dig a badly thrown ball out of the dirt and who can hit like a Missouri mule.

Pitcher—I want size and weight in pitching prospects. The right numbers are five-ten to six-two in height and between 180 and 200 pounds in weight. The sine qua non, of course, is a fast ball. 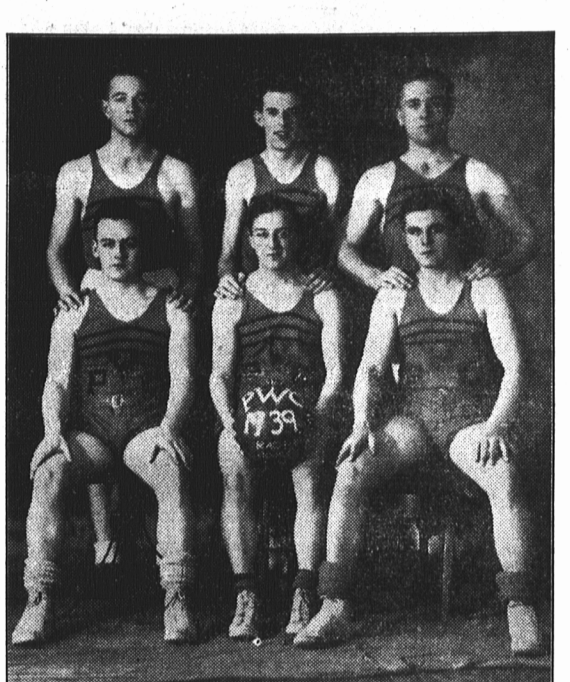

## Cubs Open Home Season By Defeating Pirates 6-2; Yanks Beat Athletics 2-1

NEW YORK, April 24—Chicago Cubs opened their home season auspiciously before 15,000 fans today by whipping Pittsburgh 6-2 for their third victory in four games.

The Cubs massed a 12-hit attack off Jim Tobin and Mace Brown while Earl Whitehill limited the Pirates to six hits in seven innings. Jack Russell finished the game, after Whitehill tired, and yielded one hit in two innings.

Behind the six-hit pitching of Lou Fette, Boston Bees invaded Brooklyn and whipped the Dodgers 4-1, handing Van Mungo a defeat in his first baseball start since last August.

The temperamental fireball gave up only five hits in the eight innings he worked, but three of them were bunched in the second when the Bees clinched the game with two runs. A Brooklyn error netted another run in the fourth and Tony Cucinello clouted a homer in the ninth.

The Giants staged a five-run rally in the eighth at Philadelphia, but the outburst fell just short and the Phillies won 6-5. Morrie Aronovitch's two-run homer in the fourth off Clyde Castlemann paced the Phil's attack.

Pearson went to the mound for the first time this season and pitched the Yankees to a 2-1 victory over Philadelphia Athletics before 5,800 fans today.

The stylist right-hander gave up only four hits, no more than one in any one inning. The Yanks tagged Nelson Foster and Chubby Dean for only three safe blows, but one was a homer by Red Rolfe in the sixth. The other Yankee run came in the seventh on two walks and an error.

**Bridges In Form**  
Veteran Tommy Bridges rang up his second triumph of the season at Detroit as Tigers downed St. Louis Browns 4-2. Bridges allowed only six hits, and fielding lapses of his mates accounted for both of the St. Louis runs.

Fifteen bases on balls walked Chicago White Sox into a 9-3 victory over the Indians at Cleveland's season's opener. Johnny Humphries leaped five free passes in two innings and Tom Drake added 10 more before Johnny Allen, making his first appearance since an elbow ailment put him on the shelf last summer, filled the gap in the seventh.

At Boston, a three-hit baggy in the 10th against Jim Bagby, the fifth pitcher they faced, gave Washington Senators a 10-9 victory over the Red Sox.
