Sentences In Sugar Coupon Cases Revised

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell quashed three convictions of subsidiary Magistrate K. M. Martin yesterday on the ground that the charges on which the convictions were based were included in other charges for which the defendants were sentenced to jail sentences without the option of a fine.

Some weeks ago, Lawson MacEachern, Cherry Valley, was charged with having illegal sugar coupons in his possession and also with having unlawfully acquired sugar coupons with those coupons.

Yesterday the Chief Justice changed the first sentence from three months in jail to a fine of \$300 and costs or two months in jail, and he quashed the secondary charge of unlawfully acquiring rationed goods, on the ground that the second charge was involved in the first since the defendant had unlawfully acquire the sugar without having the illegal coupons in his possession.

The Chief Justice followed the same procedure in the case of E. C. Burches, Charlottetown.

In the case of Donald Campbell, also of Charlottetown, who, on a charge of unlawful possession of sugar coupons, had been sentenced to six months in jail by Stipendiary Magistrate Martin, the Chief Justice imposed a fine of \$300 and costs or three months in jail or a fine of \$300.

according to available records, did not begin until 1923 when one was destroyed in the Doukhobor district of British Columbia.

That was the first of an estimated more than 300 buildings to have been destroyed or damaged allegedly by radical Doukhobors.

Homeless enough both Verigin's family and the Doukhobors were destroyed by fire, one of them set by Sons of Freedom who were convicted.

A year later, Verigin and nine other passengers were killed when a railway coach in which he was travelling from Brilliant to Grand Forks was mysteriously blown up.

The perpetrators were never caught. The Doukhobors blamed the Government. Eight years later his tomb at Brilliant was blown up.

Wild Episodes Verigin's son, Peter, was called from Russia and his term as leader until his death in 1939 was marked by a series of wild episodes which included the burning of a penitentiary sentence for perjury and lesser sentences for disturbing the peace in beverage rooms and hotels.

A few months after Verigin's death the Second World War broke out and this brought a new wave of incendiarism and nihilist parades in protest against the National Mobilization Act which required all Canadians to undergo military service or service in camps for conscientious objectors.

Most Doukhobors served in the alternative service camp although a few young men volunteered to serve with the Canadian forces. These were particularly from the orthodox group which aided the war effort further by purchasing victory bonds and contributing to the Red Cross.
