## ROUMANIANS URGED TO ACCEPT DECISIONS

### Food Supplies to Hungary Have Been Stopped by Interallied Controllor.

(Special to The Guardian). PARIS, Aug. 8.—The supreme council has sent a note to the Roumanian authorities begging them to conform with the decisions of the Entente and not to embarrass by previous decisions the work of the inter-allied investigating commissions sent to Budapest.

## Gold Discovered in Quebec

(Special to The Guardian). QUEBEC, August 8.—Gold deposits have been discovered in the Abitibi region on the shores of Lake Kienawie on a farm a Polish settler was cultivating. He has just "dredged out" his claim to a British Company capitalized in England and which paid for the property the sum of \$950.00. An analysis of the Provincial Department of mines and those of the firm declared the ore is very rich and much similar to that which was found in the Cobalt region in Ontario.

## Reducing German Rhine Forces

(Special to The Guardian). COBLENZ, Aug. 8.—The process of reducing the German forces along the Eastern front which numbered more than 200,000 at the time of the signing of the peace treaty, appears to have begun, according to information reaching army headquarters here. Some of the troops belonging to the 8th Corps District along the Eastern front have already been moved back in expectation of the occupation of Silesia and West Prussia by the Poles. In addition some of the units which were sent to the Eastern front from interior Germany during the spring of 1919 have returned to the section where they were recruited.

## BRITAIN WILL TAKE CANADIAN WHEAT

### Facilities are also in Sight for the Transatlantic Carriage of Canadian Crop.

(Special to The Guardian). LONDON, Aug. 8.—The British government will take a large part of Canada's wheat. A statement to this effect was made today by Lloyd Harris, chairman of the Canadian Trade Mission, which has been taking up the matter with the government. The British who at first intimated they would not need the Canadian wheat appear to have reconsidered the matter. Although he would not discuss the question fully, Mr. Harris stated that the prospects for disposal of the wheat surplus were excellent now. His statement should also allay fears regarding the necessary tonnage to handle the grain, as he hinted there were very good hopes of obtaining the necessary facilities.

## RUMANIANS MAKE UNREASONABLE DEMANDS

### Conference Fears Result Will be Overthrow of Hungarian Government.

(Special to The Guardian). PARIS, Aug. 6.—The Rumanians served an ultimatum on the Hungarian Government, according to messages reaching the Peace Conference. The ultimatum, it is stated, makes demands far in excess of the armistice terms and gives the Hungarians until eight p. m. today to comply with them. It is greatly feared in conference circles that the Rumanian action will result in the overthrow of the new Hungarian Government. French circles state that the Rumanian army is not under the command of Marshal Foch, the Rumanian Generals refusing to accept orders from the French. The Rumanians have not been actively participating in the Peace Conference since Premier Dratino some time ago took exception to the decision of the conference upon the principle of guaranteeing the rights of minorities within national borders.

## French Press Distrusts Joseph

(Special to The Guardian). PARIS, Aug. 8.—News papers today commented with some show of excitement on the new government of Archduke Joseph in Hungary and speculated upon the probable attitude of the Allies toward it. Some distrust of Archduke Joseph was expressed by the majority of the newspapers and an attitude of reserve was urged.

## Many Lives Believed Lost

(Special to The Guardian). HALIFAX, Aug. 8.—Another marine disaster has taken place in the North Atlantic, and death toll remains a mystery. Wednesday night, while making her way from Wabana, Nfld., to North Sydney, the steamer War Witch, was in collision with the French tern schooner Gallia, bound from France to St. Pierre. Although no particulars of the collision have been received, it is believed that the schooner sank immediately. The steamer, which rescued only four of the vessel's passengers and three of her crew, is expected to arrive at North Sydney at nine o'clock this morning when the story of the disaster will be made known.

## "Black Fox King" May be Governor

(Special to The Guardian). OTTAWA, Aug. 7.—Hon. Charles Dalton, "Black Fox King" of Prince Edward Island, will probably be appointed Lieutenant-Governor of that Province. It is also reported that ex-Premier Arsenault will be appointed to a vacancy on the Supreme Court bench in the Island Province.

Sir Arthur Currie Will Land in Halifax (Special to The Guardian). HALIFAX, August 8.—Lieut. Gen. Sir Arthur Currie will land in Halifax He is expected to arrive here about August 13 or 14. ## "NATIONAL BANKRUPTCY" SAYS MR. CHAMBERLAIN

### National Bankruptcy Faces the British Empire if Expenditure is Continued as at Present. He Proposes Abolition of Bonuses.

(Special to The Guardian). LONDON, Aug. 8.—"If we continue spending at the rate we are now it will lead straight to national bankruptcy," was the strong warning J. Austen Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, gave the House of Commons tonight. "If we can't increase production nor reduce expenditure, that alone will be sufficient. We have got to do both if we are to pull through and turn the corner. The balance between expenditure and revenue is seriously less favorable than when I made my budget statement. Both sides of the accounts are falling to realize expectations. The delay in the conclusion of peace favours us."

## Bolshevik Sub Sunk by British

(Special to The Guardian). LONDON, Aug. 8.—A Bolshevik submarine has been sunk in the Baltic Sea by the British torpedo boat destroyers Valorous and Vancouver, according to an official statement issued by the Admiralty this evening.

## Sir James Ross Receives Loving Cup

(Special to The Guardian). SIR JAMES ROSS was presented to General James Ross, Lieutenant General, by officers of the Canadian corps who worked with him during the past three years. Mrs. Ross also was associated with the gift, and with the many cordial sentiments which accompanied it.

## Prince of Wales' Visit to States

(Special to The Guardian). LONDON, Aug. 7.—The newspapers this afternoon reiterated a statement printed this morning that the visit of the Prince of Wales to the United States means something more than a formal return to the visit of President Wilson to England. "Through him the peoples of the Empire will be able to express in the fullest sense their fellowship with the people of America," says the News. "He has only to be his own simple modest self, to be welcomed for his own sake, just as the dominions troops welcomed him for the man he was and not for his rank. In the United States also he will depend upon the same human credentials."

## Serious Conditions in Asiatic Turkey

(Special to The Guardian). PARIS, Aug. 8.—Despatches reaching the peace conference from Asiatic Turkey indicate that the nationalist movement is becoming much stronger in Armenia. The situation is becoming alarming. The foodstuffs are entirely cut off and Turkish troops are closing in upon the Armenians because of the withdrawal of the British troops to replace the British. This makes the future of the Armenian nation seem especially dark.

## Germany Issues Six Billion Marks

WEIMAR, Aug. 8.—A bill was presented in the German National Assembly today under the terms of which the Finance Minister will be authorized to issue six billion marks in treasury warrants and new money during the coming year. The purpose of the bill is to make more fluid and strengthen temporarily the ordinary cash supply of the imperial treasury.

## Chilean Senator Visits Paris

(Special to The Guardian). PARIS, Aug. 8.—Senator Eleodor Yanez, of Chile, who is on a tour of the world with the Chilean commercial mission, was received in private audience yesterday by Stephen Pichon, the Foreign Minister. The conversation is described as having been very cordial. After his visit to M. Pichon, Senator Yanez had a long interview with the director of the American Affairs at the foreign office.

## Ontario Increases Teaches' Salaries

(Special to The Guardian). TORONTO, Aug. 8.—Reports reaching the Department of Education from different rural sections of the province are most encouraging with regard to the increase in salaries to the rural teachers. Some time ago the Minister of Education, Hon. H. J. Cody, issued a circular to the inspectors of the province pointing out to them that teachers' salaries should be increased to keep pace with the increase in the cost of living. It appears that the school boards have responded to the appeals of the inspectors and that generous increases have been made in different locations in Ontario. One inspector, writing from Kent County, states that each teacher's salary had been raised from \$50 to \$300.
