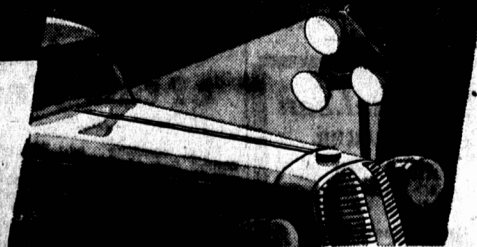

They themselves are ready for action and with plenty of activity to offer from the future and it is indeed encouraging to find how willingly they are coming forward to play their part, but we older people realize that we are falling them utterly if we do not lead them. We all know in our hearts the Guide Promise and Laws into our educational system there never would be so much selflessness and interest in our intercourse with our fellow men.

"I feel particularly anxious that we should make a greater effort about our Rangers; they are of the age nearest to the turbulent aftermath of the war years. Boys and girls of the Rover and Ranger age always want to get together and venture to think that under careful leadership it should be feasible to try out some form of joint activity, joint social work, joint study, even joint camping might be a great education in

Minister Nails Pouliot Misstatement Re Mr. Borden K. C.

OTTAWA, Nov. 21 — (CP) — Jean Francois Pouliot (L-Ten-Iscoona) today rebuffed the House of Commons with a charge that Henry Borden, K.C., Toronto counsel, had taken advantage of his position as co-ordinator of controls in the Munitions Department to "fatten" his law office and "collect" funds for the Tory Party.

Mr. Borden worked for the Department five years without salary and when certain fees inadvertently went to his law office he passed them down and returned them in a cheque to the Receiver General of Canada. No man had worked harder for the cause than he.

Canadian Potato Production

The second estimate of the 1945 Canadian potato crop was published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics on November 14. The figures indicate a somewhat larger crop than forecast in October and production is now placed at 60,392,000 bushels as compared with 58,640,000 bushels last month and the large 1944 crop of 82,348,000 bushels. Improvements, as compared with a month ago, are confined to P. E. I., Ontario and Manitoba with the bulk of the increase in the two former provinces.
