RECEPTION

A large number of friends gathered at the home of Mrs. McPhee, Mitchell River, on the evening of July 25th, to do honor to her soldier son, Callistus on his safe arrival home from overseas and to express their regret that he is soon to leave his island home to seek his fortune in the Canadian West.

Pte. McPhee enlisted in the 105th, in December 1915, went overseas in November 1916, and when the 105th was broken up was in the first draft sent to France. He fought with the 13th Battalion till the armistice was signed, except for a period in 1917 when he was in hospital suffering from shrapnel wounds and gas. When the armistice was signed he went to Germany and remained there till his Battalion was sent home to Canada in April 1919.

His friends presented him with a purse, and the following address, to which Mr. McPhee made a graceful and pleasing response, after which all present sat down to a delicious supper served by the hostess Mrs. McPhee assisted by Mrs. James Fay and Miss Harriet Fraser. Then a few pleasant hours were spent in dancing to the sweet strains of music rendered by local talented violinists. In the "wee sma' hours" the company departed glad to meet, sorry to part, and happy to meet again. The following is the address:

Pte. Otis McPhee.

Dear Comrade:—We your friends and associates are gathered here this evening to welcome you back to your homeland. Words fail to express how happy we are to have you with us once again. You have been sorely missed from our circle during the long sorrow-laden years of war, during which time you fought for God and this dear Canada of ours.

Many of the boys who went to suffer and to die if necessary for the great cause of freedom are sleeping their last long sleep in France tonight, and this reminds us more forcibly how thankful we should be that you have been spared to us. We ask you to accept this small purse not for its own intrinsic value but as a slight token of our appreciation of the services you have rendered your country. We understand you are about to leave for the Canadian West and wish to assure you that you carry our best wishes for success in all your undertakings.

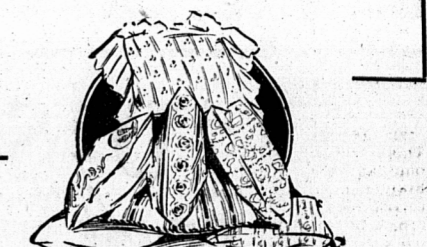
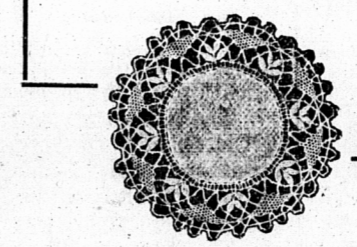
