PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

And Its Attractions to Tourists.

Prince Edward Island's summer
climate is delightful, and the scenery is
beautiful and quietly picturesque. Sur-
rounded by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, it
enjoys all the coolness of the sea breeze,
and the advantages that can only be de-
rived from sea bathing, at about 65 de-
grees.

Charlottetown has over 12,000 in-
habitants, and is the capital. It has
many great retail stores, besides a large
wholesale trade. It has a Gas Light
and Power Company, two Electric
light plants, and a street railway in
embryo. It has a first class water
works and sewerage system. It is
famed for its wide and shaded streets
its many pleasant drives, the principal
of which is the new Park Boulevard, its
attractive surroundings, pure water
and clear, cool and bracing air. It is
widely known as one of the healthiest
cities in Canada. It has two
hospitals, many churches and a large and
elegant new Opera house. It also has
several fine public buildings and a market
which is one of the chief sources of the
citizens' here. It has one of the largest
and best equipped pork-packing establish-
ments in the Dominion. On its west side
Victoria Park—a favorite summer re-
sort—while on the east, are the magnifi-
cent new Exhibition Buildings and Driv-
ing Park. Chief among its public squares
is Queen Square in the centre of the city,
beautifully laid out with blooming plants
of every description, fountains, and well
arranged walks, and enlivened with a
band of music during the summer even-
ings. The rural scenery in the vicinity of
Charlottetown is charming, and horses
for driving are abundant at very low
prices. Boats can also be hired, and
steamers run regularly on the bays and
rivers, affording most pleasant excursions.
The principal hotels are Davies, Queen,
and Revere.

Summerside has about 3000 inhabitants.
It is situated on beautiful Bedouque Bay.
It has the largest and finest departmental
store in the Maritime Provinces, besides
having other large retail stores. It has an
Electric Light Plant, and a water works
system and sewerage are being agitate
for. The hotels are—Clifton, Queen, Russ
Strathcona and Campbell.

Georgetown and Souris have a popula-
tion of about 1,000 each. In the former
are the Aitken, and Tapper hotels and in
Souris the Sea View.

At Cape Traverse, a very pleasant sum-
mer resort, is the Landsdowne hotel; in
Alberton, the Albion Terrace and Wiser;
in Tignish the Railway and Bellevue; in
Kensington, Clark's and Commercial; in
Montague, McDonald; and in Mount
Stewart, Clark's and Manson's.

The following hotels open for the
summer season: At Hampton, Pleasant
View; at Stanhope, Mutch's and Cliff; at
Brackley Point, Shaw's; at Rustico, Sea
side; at Malpeque, North Shore; at
Tracadie Beach, Acadia; at Alberton, Sea-
forth; and at Powna, Florida.

In addition to those already mentioned
there are other towns and villages in the
Province with hotel accommodation,
while many farm houses prepare for the
reception of tourists. The rivers and
streams teem with trout, the bays with
mackerel, while game of every description
abounds.

Unsuccessful in London.

20,000 Tons of Pulp.

(Halifax Herald.)

The great consumption of paper during
the past year has made the pulp industry
of Nova Scotia far more important than
was dreamed of twelve months ago. Not
only can every pound of pulp be marketed,
but the supply is not equal to the demand.
The export of pulp from Halifax this year
has been the largest yet made. The ship-
ments were carried out in large quantities,
but in the near future all records will be
eclipsed. One large firm which handles
much pulp is endeavoring to place con-
tracts for 20,000 tons in a single order, and
this large quantity will all be handled in
Halifax. If the deal goes through, it is
probable that much of the stock will be
arrived in steamers, specially chartered
for the purpose, and the balance will go
over on the Furness line.

An Unwelcome Gift.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—An Italian
who gave his name as "Prof. Figuccia,"
of Felucca, Italy, caused some excitement
at the White House to-day, by exhibiting a
projectile, which he wished to present to
the president. He came during the fore-
noon, accompanied by a negro, who bore a
large satchel. When stopped at the front
door by an usher, he presented a slip of
paper bearing this inscription: "Prof.
Figuccia presents this projectile to the
president of the United States. He took
out of the satchel a very heavy brass
projectile, and a long wire, and explained
that the pushing of the wire through a
hole which had been bored in the end of
the projectile would cause big explosion.
The visitor could speak no English, and
made known his mission by signs. After
some questioning it was concluded the
Italian was an inventor seeking official
recognition of his device, and he was
directed to the Italian embassy. Later
the secret service was notified.

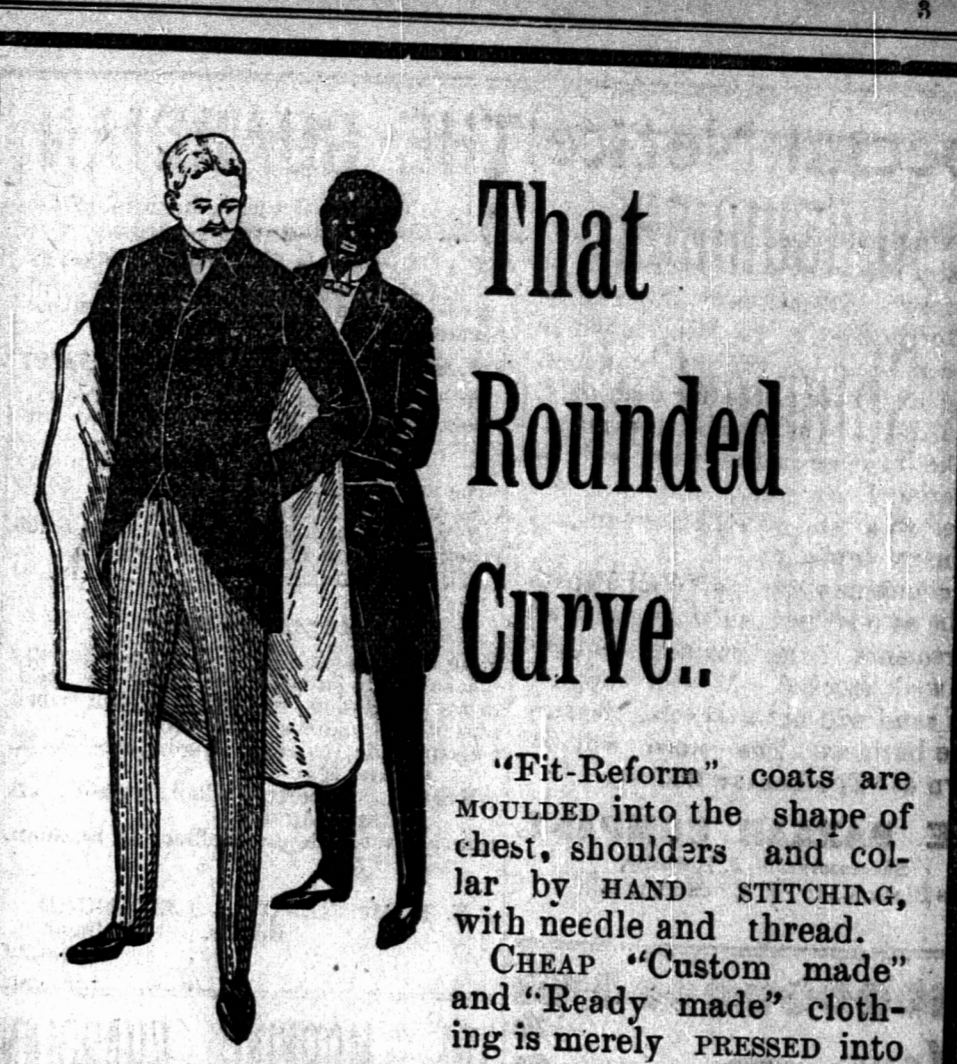
