**New Industry For Moncton And The Maritimes**

In a discussion today with Mr. M. P. Fraser, Vice President and Mr. H. L. Hill, General Manager of Sunner Company Limited, it was learned that a new industry is being brought to Moncton in the form of a \$100,000 bottling plant for Propane Gas. This is the first plant of its kind in the Maritime Provinces.

A new company is presently being formed and will be called "Sunner Propane Gas Limited." A permit has been granted by the City for the storage plant and authorization has been received from Federal authorities at Ottawa for all the necessary U. S. funds for equipment imported from the United States.

The new plant, which will be located at Victory Industrial Centre (No. 31 Depot) will necessitate the installation of a huge 30,000 gallon specially constructed storage tank for liquid Propane under pressure. The tank is being brought from the United States on two flat cars and weighs in excess of 70,000 pounds, 67 1/2 feet long. The plant will also entail the construction of a new building to house the special L.B. Gas compressors and pumps and all the equipment necessary for the bottling operation.

The bottling operation includes pumping the liquid Propane from the storage tanks into the steel cylinders where the product is kept under pressure in liquid form.

It is the intention of the new company to establish dealers for bottled gas throughout the Maritimes with a uniform sales policy and program which will assure the consumer of receiving the highest quality Propane at a reasonable price. All plant equipment, specially constructed cylinders for customers use and method of handling installations will be conducted in accordance with Government regulations. With the establishment of propane distributors throughout the Maritimes, the outstanding advantages of this fuel will be brought to the rural as well as the urban districts, new comfort for the farm as well as the city dweller.

"So!" said Carl. "Indeed he can take it, this American friend of yours."

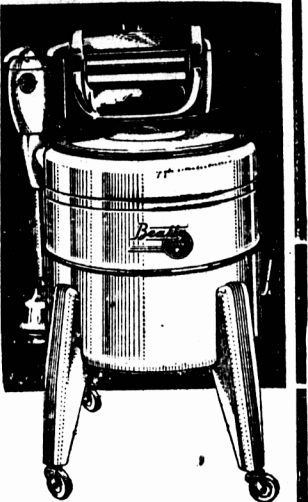
