TERRIBLE DEATH LIST FROM HEAT IN STATES

New York City Alone Had 23 Fatalities and 187 Prostrations--Casualties in Other Cities Very Large--Brooklyn Threatened With Water Famine and Icemen Are Talking Strike.

New York, July 18--An area of oppressive heat has settled down over the eastern and New England states already numbering hundreds among its victims and causing indescribable suffering to thousands in this and other cities.

Brooklyn was threatened with a water famine, while the whole city was startled by the prospect of a strike of the icemen.

The above figure by no means represent the sum of human suffering today as an endless number of victims who collapsed at home or in the office or workshop, were privately attended.

At 8 a. m. the mercury stood at 80 and rose slightly until the maximum of 96 was reached at 4 o'clock. The humidity was 72 at 8 o'clock, but lessened steadily until 35 was registered, when the temperature was highest.

As usual most of the reported deaths were among the poorer classes. The prostrations, however, were not confined to these, and many persons in apparent good health succumbed.

Early in the day the hot wave invaded the stock exchange and its effect was quickly apparent upon traders.
