Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$5.00. Area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

WHY WAS THE OATH OMITTED?

Sir,—The Election Act of 1913, Section 195, enacts as follows: "Before a member elect of the Legislative Assembly, is permitted to take the oath as a member, he shall file with the clerk of the House, or with the Commissioners, or one of the Commissioners appointed by the Lieutenant Governor, to administer to the members present the oath heretofore required by law, an affidavit duly sworn before the clerk or before the said Commissioners or one of them that except in respect of his necessary and lawful expenses he has not made nor authorized nor knowingly permitted any other person or persons to make on his behalf before or during his election, and will not make any payment, advance, loan or deposit for the purposes of the election, and that the deponent has not been guilty of any corrupt practice in respect of said election, and may be in the Form 'H. H.' here, or to its effect."

The form of oath required by this Section is found on page 127 of the Election Act and is as follows:—
Form "H. H."
Form of members oath as to the expenses of election
"I, of in the County of elected to repre-

sent the Electoral District of County as Councillor or Assemblyman, as the case may be, make oath and say that except as to necessary and lawful expenses, I have not made nor authorized, nor knowingly permitted, any other person or persons to make on my behalf, before, during or since the election, any payment, advance, loan or deposit for the purpose of the election, except as aforesaid, and I further say that I have not been guilty of corrupt practice in respect of said election. Sworn before me The day of A. D. 19 at in County.

Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, (or Commissioners as the case may be.)
I am informed on good authority, that none of the members of the present Legislature took the oath, as required by the Act. If this is so, then none of the members elect should have been permitted to take the oath as a member or to sit as a member in the present House.

If the Legislators themselves purposely ignore an important enactment of this kind, is it any wonder that lesser lights show a contempt for the law? I feel that an explanation is due to the public from the members of the Government, and I ask them to explain in the House before it prorogues why this section of the law was totally ignored. 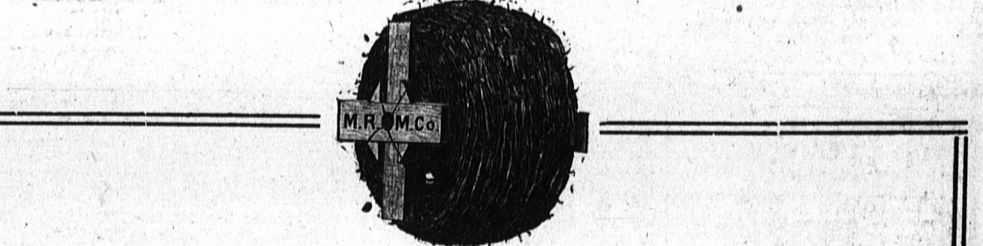
