WARTIME NICOTINE
VANCOUVER (CP)—"More tobacco is smoked during a national crisis than at any other time, probably as a reaction from the jittery," announces James E. Reilly, tobacco distributor, commenting on recent increased sales.

ROTARY
Miss Elizabeth MacMillan of the Department of Fisheries at Ottawa was the guest speaker at the Rotary luncheon at "The Charlottetown" at noon yesterday. Miss MacMillan was formerly supervisor of Women's Institutes in this province and later organized the Institute work in Newfoundland. She is now one of the four demonstrators employed by the Publicity Department of the Federal Department of Fisheries.

ROTARY
She recalled that when the Department started the fish popularizing campaign in Canada back in 1936, Canada was rated among the lowest fish-consuming peoples. Top at that time was the Netherlands with some 70 pounds per person per year. The figure for Canada at that time was 21 pounds. Great Britain's figure by comparison was 40 lbs. per person per year.
But there has been improvement noted since 1936. The most recent figures published by the Department show Canada with an all time high fish consumption of 28 pounds per person per annum for

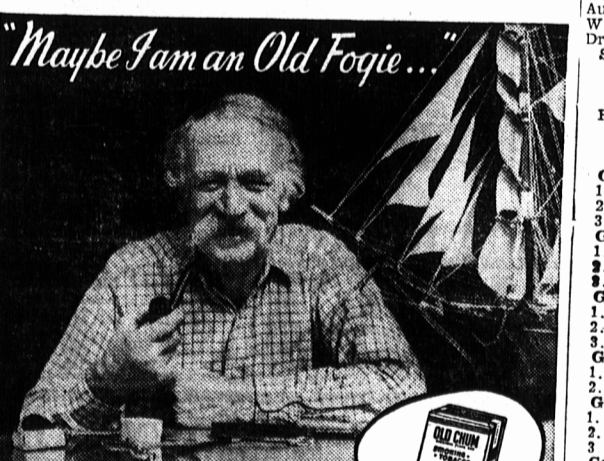

In Memoriam

JOHN CHARLES MACAULAY

Many friends join with his bereaved family in mourning the death of John Charles MacAulay, which occurred at his home in Stanhope on January 16, 1940. The deceased had been in ill health for the past two years bore his suffering cheerfully and with true Christian resignation.
Mr. MacAulay was born seventy-five years ago at the old family homestead at Stanhope, which had been in the possession of the MacAulays for three generations. His great grandfather, Malcolm MacAulay, was one of the original Highland settlers in that part of the Island and his mother Catherine McIntyre belonged to another old Scottish family, being a grand niece of the venerated Bishop MacEachern. Mr. MacAulay's property was one of those sold to the Government to make a site for the National Park, and two years ago he with his family moved to Stanhope, which is now owned by James McCabe at Stanhope. There was general regret at the closing of the old house so long treasured for its warm hearted hospitality.
In 1897, Mr. MacAulay married Margaret McLaughlin of Grand Tracadie, a school teacher who survives him. Her tender care and untiring devotedness did much to comfort and cheer her husband during his long illness. Of their family, eleven children there are left, to cherish the memory of their good father four sons and six daughters: N. D. Montreal, Sister St. Margaret, N. D., Montreal, Sister St. Margaret, N.
