**Weekly Livestock And Market Report**

**SUMMARY**

Anticipation of sharply increased prices for cattle, due to the recent removal of export restrictions, brought out record cattle runs including a large proportion of inferior quality, in the past week. A combination of circumstances, however, including the heavy offering, a seasonally slow hot-weather demand for meats, and reluctance of buyers on United States account to pay the increased asking prices, resulted in a sluggish opening trade with consequent heavy daily carryovers. After the market finally settled down to a definite trading basis, the result was a general decline of \$1 to 25¢ for butcher cattle.

Following the previous week's sharp upward movement in calf prices, the market settled back to a more solid trading basis and prices as a rule were considerably lower this week. While Toronto held steady at \$26 to \$28 for good veals, Montreal was down \$1, with good calves \$24 to \$26, Winnipeg mostly up to \$22 with some sales to \$25, Calgary \$1 lower at \$20 to \$22, Edmonton lower at \$23 to \$25, Prince Albert \$23, Moose Jaw down \$2 to \$4, mostly at \$18 with a few \$20, Saskatoon \$21, and Regina \$22.

**Eastern Cattle Markets**  
A general drop of \$1 to \$2 took place in the eastern market. A record run of nearly 12,000 cattle was on hand. Top on weighty steers was from \$26 to \$27 with butcher steers closing from \$22 down to \$20. Prices at Montreal were sharply lower, particularly on low grade steers and heifers. Good steers were quoted up to \$26.50, with others as low as \$23, and good cows sold all the way from \$17.50 to \$19.

**Western Cattle Markets**  
Western markets suffered from an overload of inferior quality cattle, and paring of prices was the natural result. Packer buyers were generally operating on canneries and cutters and boning material. At Winnipeg most classes of butcher stock were fully \$1.00 lower, with odd loads of the better steers going at \$23 to \$24 and medium to good slaughter material \$18 to \$22. Principal activity was on suitable feeder cattle at around \$22. Calgary was active despite liberal receipts, and good to choice steers brought \$21 to \$26 while Edmonton was down \$2 with most good steers around \$21 and an odd \$22. Best of the offering, which was not always of top quality, sold at Prince Albert at around \$22; Moose Jaw \$19 to \$21; Saskatoon up to \$23; and Regina \$22.

**Exports to United States**  
Exports of slaughter and feeding stock to the United States in the past week amounted to 9,400 head, making the total since the removal of the embargo 12,285. Shipments of dairy and pure bred

cattle for the week totalled 3,327. Calf exports totalled 1,668 and since the embargo removed amount to 3,594; while the week's exports of sheep and lambs was 970 head and the total to date this year 2,361.

**Calf Prices React Downward**  
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**LIVESTOCK NEEDS MINERALS WHEN OFF PASTURE**  
When cattle are taken off pasture in the fall and stabled, their diet is changed drastically in many cases. The bulk of their feed is then obtained from grains and hay. This does not provide as high a level of mineral elements as are obtained when animals are on pasture. It is important therefore to start feeding mineral feed supplements.

Discussing this phase of livestock management, Ralph E. Cadmore, development manager of C-I-L's agricultural chemicals division, points out that mineral deficiencies usually contribute to a decrease in milk production in case of dairy cattle and less rapid gains with beef. Although effects of mineral lack may not be obvious, animals are nevertheless not as thrifty and, in young cattle, development of bone and body structure may be severely retarded. In severe cases of mineral malnutrition, diseases such as rickets occur.

To replace minerals usually obtained in abundance from good pastures, Mr. Cadmore suggested feeding of recognized supplements which contain such necessary elements as phosphorus, iron, iodine, salt, sulphur, copper and manganese.

According to the agricultural authority, animals do not have the ability to store minerals in their bodies in the same day they store carbohydrates in form of fat. For this reason, a satisfactory feeding program calls for daily feedings of mineral supplements
