Discuss Electric Service in O'Leary And Vicinity

A meeting was called yesterday to discuss electric service in O'Leary, Unionville and Knutsford. Mr. J. M. MacWilliams, O'Leary, was chairman. Only speaker was Mr. V. A. Ainsworth, Manager of Maritime Electric Co., who stated that the rates for the service will be the same as at present except that the 25 cent rate per family per month for street lights and the 15 dollar rate for new connections will be abolished. Mr. Ainsworth recommended that Mr. Thomas Phillips represent the Maritime Electric in O'Leary. It was decided that a committee of three be appointed to canvass the district to see how many customers will be willing to pay 50 cents a month for a period of 5 years, 45 cents being for lights and 5 cents for cost of collection. Messrs Claude Jelly, Bernard Shea, and George Matheson were appointed to report to another citizens meeting in a week's time when a committee will be formed to draw up a contract with the Maritime Electric for street lights. The new street lights will be 100 watts. The old ones, 60 in number, are mostly 25 watts.

with a pen of light Sussex and the second prize was won by Ben V. Arsenault, St. Raphael with a pen of White Leghorns. The Mont Carmel and Abrams Village Poultry Clubs were represented by exhibitors but Mr. Scanton said he would like to have seen more entries from both clubs.

Mr. H.C.M. Heartz of the Dominion Department of Agriculture and Mr. Almon Boswell of Dunstons judged the swine. Mr. Heartz said he was judging at Egmont Bay for the first time and so could not compare the exhibits with those of other years. He said that the sows shown were good and show good breeding but were not fat enough. He said they showed though, that the people of the district are taking advantage of the type of stock available as breeders. The champion sow of the show was owned by Mr. Zenon Gallant of Urbanville and the champion boar was owned by Mr. Adrian Arsenault of Urbanville. This, Mr. Heartz stated, was a particularly fine boar and its full brother had sold for \$500 this year to an American buyer. The over all quality of swine was as good as one could expect to find, he said. The bacon hog classes were fuller than the others.

Sheep Very Good

Mr. Almon Boswell also judged the sheep which he said were very good. He pointed out that one pen of lambs should have won first place but as they were buck lambs had been given only second prize. He said that Egmont Bay is always a good place for sheep but there should be more on exhibition.

Mr. Stewart Wright of the Provincial Department of Agriculture judged the calves. He said there was a good showing by the Urbanville Calf Club of six yearlings and six 2-year olds. They were a credit to the boys and girls of the club. St. Philip Ayrshire Club had a smaller showing but among them were some fine calves. Mr. David Peacock of the Provincial Department of Agriculture judged the cattle classes which seemed to be better filled than last year.

Mr. W.J. Reid of Middleton was the judge of the horses and he said that they were fewer in number but the quality was maintained. He pointed out that there were hardly any young horses and no foals at all which indicated that the farmers are giving up breeding horses. There was also an interesting display of roots and vegetables. The weight pulling contest for teams drew much attention as always.

Lt. Governor Bernard

In his opening remarks Lieutenant Governor Bernard said he had made the rounds of the exhibits and was impressed with them particularly with the handicrafts and preserves. He said it was always a pleasure to attend this exhibition and to meet so many friends in this thriving community. He said, "The exhibition gives each one of your family an opportunity to show what they can do, entering into friendly competition and there is no greater practical education than that which you receive here and will absorb and utilize for your own benefit and advancement. It is always noted that the best farmers are those who are exhibitors and the same can be truly said about those who have entries here today. I compliment your exhibitors for the large and varied showing you have in and around the buildings. It speaks well for your incentive and for your great interest in this fine exhibition." He encouraged the younger generation to take an interest in their fair and when the older people retire, it will be up to them to carry on.

Premier Jones

Premier Jones said that he never saw so many people in attendances at this fair before. He said that the best exhibit that the Acadian people have is the Lieutenant Governor's exhibit. He would probably have thrown MacKay out at first, but he elected to charge the ball for a pick-up play and missed the pellet entirely. We scored it a hit but some somersaults of baseball waxed slightly hysterical at our decision. We still think it was a hit the way DeLong played the ball, however. You know fielders can not only rob batters of hits, they can also present batters with hits by the way they play the ball. The pitcher didn't deserve to have a hit scored against him, we admit that, but that didn't stop the bingle from being a hit. We're not panning DeLong on the play. He is one of the best third basemen in these parts and such misplays will happen to the cream of the crop sometimes.

He said that the area included by the fair has been extended this year to take in Grand River and Lot 18. — S
