## PRESBYTERIANS SAFE

### Hopes are Raised But there are Stories of Massacre and Danger.

PRESBYTERIAN MISSIONARIES SAFE.  
TORONTO July 20.—(Special)—A telegram from Shanghai conveys word that the Canadian Presbyterian missionaries in China have reached a place safety.

MINISTERS STILL ALIVE IN PEKIN.  
WASHINGTON July 20.—(Special)—The State Department received a cipher message from United States Minister Conger today dated Peking July 18.

The State Department declared it authentic. Mr. Conger tells that the foreigners are all hard pressed in the British Legation under shot and shell fire and quick relief is required to prevent a general massacre.

HOPES ARE AGAIN RAISED.  
Secretary Long notified Admiral Remy with order to use and urge every means possible for their immediate relief.

This has raised high hopes that the foreigners in Peking may be saved. The belief is they must be receiving some assistance from the Chinese Government troops.

MORE MURDERS—SHANGHAI IN DANGER.  
LONDON, July 20.—(Special)—Reports say sixty missionaries and a hundred native Christians in Tai Yuang have been massacred and this presages an attack on Shanghai.

INDIAN TROOPS ARE ARRIVING.  
Indian troops are daily arriving at Hong Kong.

The Chinese force commanding Shanghai is being daily strengthened and foreigners view these arrivals with alarm.

RUSSIA SENDING TROOPS.

### Returns From British Columbia.

## A STABLE GOVERNMENT

### And Great Natural Resources Assure the Fine Future of B. C.

As intimated in our columns yesterday morning Hon. Ferd. Peters arrived in the city on Thursday evening from Vancouver, B. C. Yesterday evening a GUARDIAN representative waited upon him at the residence of Mr. Arthur Peters, Q. C. and learned the following facts about British Columbia and its vast resources. His many friends will be pleased to learn that Mr. Peters looks well and it is apparent that the air of the Pacific agrees with him. When asked as to the possibilities of British Columbia he said:  
"British Columbia is probably the most progressive part of Canada at the present time. The many possibilities of the country are simply enormous in regard to the supply of coal, gold, silver, lead and many other minerals. Many parts of the province are most favorable for the promotion of agriculture. In some of the valleys a large quantity of stock is raised.

## HER FOREIGN TRADE.

"The trade from the Pacific Coast to China and Japan is just in its infancy, and anyone who has not seen the activity that is now being displayed in this particular trade, cannot form any conception of its enormous proportions. It is enough to say, that there are steamers of a tonnage of 67,000 tons running from the Pacific ports to the different points in Japan.

"There is an immense trade in lumber in British Columbia and in a short time there will, no doubt, be large pulp mills established.

## ADVANTAGES IN WATER POWER.

"The almost unlimited water power which is now being utilized renders it possible to establish many different industries. I might mention that within a few miles of Vancouver an immense power is now being utilized. This power is being developed on what is known as the Stave River. It is hoped that from this plant will be generated sufficient power to supply all places in need of electricity and to operate all the railways now in Vancouver and Westminister and also to establish a system of electric tram cars surrounding those two places. As soon as the necessary machinery is placed for the manufacture of carbide that industry will also be added to the many other industries now in progress in the country. The utilization of this great power is only one of the many things that is drawing toward Vancouver and Victoria, the immense sums of capital that are pouring into the country.
