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BODY RECOVERED NEAR RUSTICO One of the Victims of Rustico's Double Drowning Tragedy Was Recovered Yesterday at Laird's Cove.

The body of Martin Gallant, the Rustico fisherman whose sad drowning along with his father, Solomon Gallant, was reported last month, was recovered yesterday. The body was found by another fisherman, Mr. Jerome D. Gallant, at Laird's Cove near Rustico, where it was lying in four fathoms of water and in a bad state of decomposition. It could be recognized only by the clothing. The remains were taken to the home at Rustico and interment was made last night. The body of the father, has not yet been discovered.

The victims of the Rustico drowning tragedy perished, it is supposed, by the upset of their boat in the rough sea, that prevailed off Rustico, on Tuesday May 3rd. A cap, supposed to have belonged to Martin Gallant was picked up the following day in the water, together with some loose traps and boat fittings. Despite the active search made for the missing man, nothing further had come to light until the discovery of the younger man's body yesterday. All indications, however pointed to the fact that the unfortunate man had perished when their boat foundered.

Wirth's Policy Enables Germany To Pay Cash

BERLIN, June 9.—The ability of the Wirth Government now to hand over real cash instalments on account of the indemnity, is due to Dr. Wirth's personal, far-sighted policy as Minister of Finance. The 200,000,000 gold marks now in the hands of the Federal reserve is only part of the resources the ministry began to collect by the purchase of foreign securities soon after the armistice, for the indemnity they realized they would have to pay. Dr. Wirth has been carefully concealing his plan, but now he is convinced the time has come to confirm Germany's good will by deeds expressed in dollars and cents. Leaders of industry, commerce and science are putting their heads together to discuss the situation resulting from the Government's promise to fulfill the demands of the allies' ultimatum. Poles Retreat Before British Troops

(Special to The Guardian) OPPELN, June 9.—Five thousand Polish insurgents have been driven out of the city of Rosenberg, northeast of this city, by British forces, and last night the Poles were reported to be retreating in a southeasterly direction. The Poles made a show of resistance but the British did not fire a shot. When the British soldiers entered the city the Poles dropped a few poorly aimed shells behind them and there was a scattering pattern of rifle shots from the Polish positions. The Poles then picked up their machine guns which had been set up in the road and fled.

REGINA, Sask., June 9.—Saskatchewan's citizenship went to the polls today to elect the Fifth Legislature to hold office in the Province. The new Legislature will consist of 63 members and 44 of them are being chosen today. Sixteen members, all supporters of the Martin Government, were returned by acclamation.

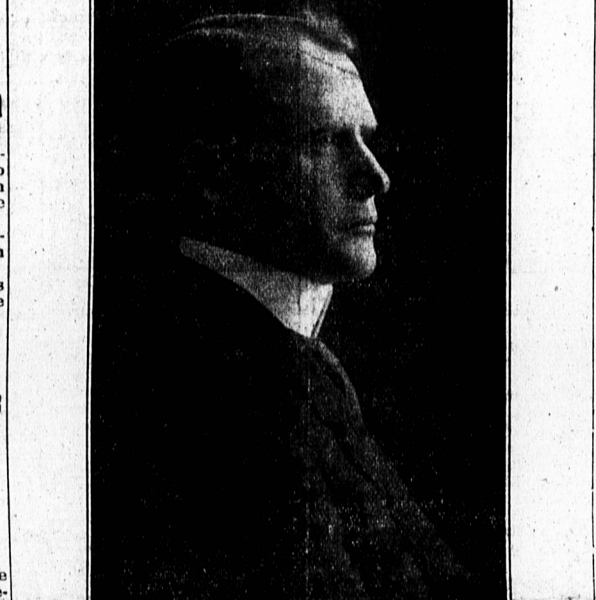
Boy Drowned

NEW LEADER OF LIBERAL-CONSERVATIVE PARTY CHOSEN

At An Euthusiastic Meeting of the District Representatives in the Board of Trade Yesterday Mr. J. D. Stewart, M.L.A., Was Unanimously Elected Provincial Leader. A meeting of the Liberal Conservative party was held in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday afternoon for the purpose of choosing a successor to the Hon. Justice A. E. Arsenault as Leader of the party. All the districts were represented, there being present in addition the protection of the public interests. Yours faithfully, A. E. ARSENAULT. On motion of Mr. J. D. Stewart, seconded by Mr. P. S. Brown, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved that the Liberal Conservative party in this Province as represented at this meeting of candidates at the last Conservative election, desires to express its sense of complete satisfaction upon the appointment of the Hon. J. A. E. Arsenault to the position of Justice of the Supreme Court. This meeting also desires to place on record the great loss sustained by the party by his removal from the position of leader. By his tact and ability in leadership, in a most difficult and trying period, his high sense of duty, his loyalty to principle and party, he has succeeded in inscribing his name high in the illustrious scroll of great Liberal Conservative leaders, and his services to his Province will be long and gratefully remembered by its citizens. It was then moved by Hon. J. A. McDonald, seconded by Mr. L. L. Jenkins, that Mr. J. D. Stewart, member for Georgetown, be appointed to succeed the Hon. Mr. Arsenault as leader of the Liberal Conservative party in the Province. The motion was unanimously adopted and Mr. Stewart in an able speech accepted the position and promised to do his utmost to lead his party along the lines of his distinguished predecessors. The question of organization was then discussed and the meeting was subsequently adjourned to meet at the call of the new leader of the party.

Britain Will Collect Canadian Credits

LONDON, June 9.—The collection of interest on Greek Government bonds covering a credit of \$25,000,000 granted by Canada to encourage trade, has been placed by the Canadian High Commissioner here, Sir George Perley, in the hands of the British Treasury for recovery in connection with the interest on British loans on the same country. The same course has been followed with regard to Roumanian bonds, interest on which is also in default. It is considered that especially in view of the present European situation, pressure from Great Britain, particularly in the case of Greece, would be more effective than from Canada, which is so much further away and, accordingly, the co-operation of the British authorities has been invoked. Garibaldi Veteran Is Dead in England

LONDON, June 9.—Jules Sambon, aged 84, one of Garibaldi's famous thousand volunteers who fought for the independence of Italy, has just died here. He was twice wounded on the Volturno battlefields. At one time he owned a remarkable collection of ancient objects illustrative of the history of the theatre throughout the ages. This was acquired by the Italian Government, and now forms the museum of the Scala Theatre in Milan. He was also the author of a notable work on coins. Sambon married Laura Elizabeth Day, a relative of Charles Dickens, and a descendant of Vitus Bering, the navigator.

U. S. Tariff On Lumber

WASHINGTON, June 9.—The ways and means committee of the House this afternoon decided to include in the Permanent Tariff Bill a duty on lumber similar to that imposed by Canada upon lumber sent to the Dominion from the United States. This is 25 per cent. A duty of one dollar per thousand was also provided for spruce, fir and hemlock logs.

By-Election Close In Lancashire

LONDON, June 9.—The bye-election in Heywood division of Lancashire, necessitated by the election of Right Hon. Albert Hillingworth to the peerage, resulted in a defeat for the Coalition. Mr. W. Halls, Labor candidate, defeated Colonel England, Coalition Liberal by the narrow margin of 305 votes.

Labor Leader Howled Down

(Special to The Guardian) VANCOUVER, June 9.—Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, was howled down in Dominion Hall here last night when he tried to address a public meeting. After an hour's unsuccessful effort to quiet the crowd Mr. Moore's supporters dispersed the meeting. The disturbance was confined to noise which appeared to come from a group in one corner of the hall. Mr. Moore had a similar experience in Victoria two nights ago.

Bolshevist Plot In Sweden

Stockholm, June 9.—What the newspapers here today considered as a sensational and widespread plot for a Bolshevist revolution in Sweden was uncovered as a result of the arrest of a widely known Bolshevist leader in Kiruna in the iron mining district. It was said that a Communist organization was discovered there. Several arrests also have been made in Stockholm.

CATERPILLAR INVASION AND HOW TO TREAT IT

Mr. J. A. Clark Discusses Nature and Treatment of Prevalent Pests Which are Reported in Many Parts of the Province. The following article by Superintendent J. A. Clark of the Experimental Farm station is of unusual interest at this time as many reports from different parts of the Island have been received of outbreaks of the Forest Tent Caterpillar with inquiries as to treatment, etc. A swarm of such insects were reported by railwaymen yesterday near St. Nicholas. It was necessary to sand the rails before the slipping of the engine wheels could be sufficiently checked to allow the train to proceed. A report of similar difficulties experienced by railwaymen in New Brunswick appears elsewhere in the Guardian. In New Brunswick the insects are said to be army worms. Mr. Clark requests the farmer in infested districts to forward to the Experimental Farm Station any details of their appearance. The invasion of these insects caused by the dryness of the season, is doing incalculable damage to crops in other parts of Canada. Their appearance here is looked upon with alarm, and the advice of Mr. Clark on the subject of treating their attack will therefore be duly weighed and considered.

voracious eaters and appear in perfect swarms. In the afternoons they collect on the trunk and branches of the trees in large black masses which are easily reached and can be destroyed with a stiff brush or other suitable implement for brushing the clusters into a pail, or crushing the congregated masses. A sudden jar will usually cause them to drop from the leaf they are feeding on and they will hang suspended by a fine thread the blossoms open or after they fall will destroy this and other pests and will not kill the bees. Avoid spraying when the trees are in full bloom and save the bees, our best friends. The egg clusters should be cut off and burned during the winter. This is easily done when pruning the trees.

Pastor Upholds Church Dignity

Special to The Guardian. OTTAWA, June 9.—Materialism has brought the world to the verge of chaos, said Rev. Dr. Trevor Davis, pastor of the Metropolitan Church, Toronto, at today's session of the Toronto Methodist Conference. A wave of selfishness has swept over the world and the remarkable thing was the complete breakdown of all systems built on force and selfishness. "We need to have a faith that is daring in its nature," he declared. "The church has been too timid, too cautious. The dismemberment of the church would be the impoverishment of the world." He added: "Dr. Davis scored those sons of the Church who went on the platform to denounce the church and its failures. Of course the church had faults that should be confessed, but the public platform was not the place to do it. Dr. Davis criticized Dean Ginge of St. Paul's London, for his statement that it was futile for the church to oppose easier divorce because the people wanted it and would have it. "The church is not the slave of humanity, it is the servant of God serving humanity according to the instructions of God, so what does it matter to the church what the people want? It is here to do the will of God."
