The armlet consists of 400 pure white diamonds. It has a platinum base and is in the shape of a fleur de lis at the wrist. A chain of guaranteed diamonds, ranging from three carats down to a carat extends from the armlet proper to the marquise ring of diamonds on her third finger.

PAUL JONES' BODY TO BE MOVED AGAIN
ANNAPOLIS, Md., Jan. 23.—The body of John Paul Jones, America's first naval officer, will be removed next Sunday from its temporary resting place in Bancroft Hall, Naval Academy, to the crypt of the New Chapel. This is to be made to his fighter's permanent resting place. It is hoped, and the chapel and the crypt were designed especially for this purpose. Arrangements for the services were completed to-day. They will be simple and dignified, the only speaker being Chaplain U. G. B. Pierce of the United States Senate.

300 KNICKERBOCKER HOTEL HANDS ARE ORDERED TO LEAVE
NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—Three hundred waiters and kitchen hands were discharged at the Knickerbocker Hotel early to-day. Pickets were placed about the hotel, and it was announced at the headquarters of the International Hotel Workers' Union that an effort would be made to tie up every big hotel and restaurant in this city. Elizabeth Gurley Flynn, the woman organizer of the Industrial Workers of the World, who is helping conduct the waiters' strike, took command. "We will tie up the hotel and restaurant business, no matter how long it takes," she said.

STRIKE LEADERS HEAVILY FINED.
NORTH BAY, Ont., Jan. 23.—Three leaders in the Porcupine mining strike were prosecuted, under the Lemieux Act, for inciting a strike at the Hollinger mine, and were found guilty yesterday before Magistrate Torrance and sentenced to five hundred dollars fine each, or three months in gaol. The accused refused to pay the fines, preferring to spend their three months in Sudbury gaol. Barrister Godfrey, of Toronto, conducted the prosecution. A. G. Staight, of Hallsbury, counsel for the accused, states he will appeal from the sentence.

VINCENT ASTOR AT SULZER RECEPTION.
ALBANY, Jan. 23.—The legislative reception given to Governor and Mrs. Sulzer was a brilliant function. About 2,500 were present. In the crush was Vincent Astor. He had to all but fight his way to shake the hand of the Governor and Mrs. Sulzer. The greeting was very cordial.

SMITHERS MAKES DENIAL.
LONDON, Jan. 25.—Alfred Smithers, chairman of the English Board of Directors of the Grand Trunk Railway, denies the report of differences among the Directors on any subject.

SEMINOLE RUSHES TO RESCUE OF MAY CREW
CHARLESTON, S. C., Jan. 23.—The revenue cutter Seminole to-day is rushing to the rescue of the crew of the freight steamer Mae, Philadelphia to Cuba. The Seminole started shortly after 6 p. m., with a run of 150 miles before her.

THE TURKS COMPLAIN
PARIS, Jan. 25.—Cherif Pasha, a friend of the deposed Grand Vizier of Turkey says that Germany and Austria have been conspiring to bring about the return to power in Turkey of a committee of union and progress which now has taken place. He says the Sultan will be dethroned and the Crown Prince put in his place.
