Presentation Of Imperial Service Medal At Tignish

When the Lieutenant Governor was at Tignish attending the funeral of his sister, Miss Winnifred Bernard, he took occasion to present Mr. E. J. McTague, retired C.N.R. Station Agent there with the Imperial Service Medal for 52 years faithful service with the Railway. The presentation took place on Sunday evening at the home of the Lieutenant Governor and was attended by Mrs. McTague, Rev. J. A. MacDonald, P.P., Rev. Emmet MacInnis, Curate, Messrs. C. T. Montgomery, J. B. Myrick and J. E. Curran, as well as by many of the business life of the village. Mr. C. A. Kinch was chairman and a pleasing program was drawn up which opened with O Canada. Mr. McTague's record of service was read by Mr. Montgomery.

The Lieutenant Governor referred to Mr. McTague's splendid record of over half a century. He pointed out that the Medal comes from the Chancery of the Order of Knighthood at St. James Palace and is given in recognition of long and uninterrupted service of a high and satisfactory quality. He referred to the great increase in railway business at Tignish and of the exacting position of station agent in connection with the public. Yet Mr. McTague had found time to take part in plays and social endeavors. He complimented Mr. McTague on his ability as a baseball player and on having been a participant in all athletic activities. He congratulated him also on his long and faithful term of service and wished him and Mrs. McTague all the good things which his retirement will bring.

Rev. J. A. MacDonald spoke very feelingly of his connections with Mr. McTague as well as of the faithful manner in which he discharged his duties of office for the benefit of his employers and the public in this vicinity. Bernard, president of the Canadian Legion, and by Lloyd MacLeod and others, while the ladies present added very suitable messages of congratulations and good wishes. The annual meeting of the Summerside Presbyterian Church was held in the Church hall on the evening of Wednesday, January 21st. Following devotional exercises, conducted by the minister, Rev. Charles Carnegie, the business session was conducted with the minister presiding, and Mr. Max Robertson acting as secretary.

The report of the Kirk Session was read by the minister and was very encouraging. Again this year the congregation considerably exceeded its allocation to the larger work of the Church through the budget. The financial statement of the Kirk Session fund, the "Everyday Fund" and the Sabbath School were submitted by Mr. Donald Baker, clerk of Sessions. The financial statement of the Church was submitted by Mr. Heath Strong, chairman of the Board of Management who, in reporting a substantial balance on hand at the end of the year, paid tribute to the work done by the Ladies Club and the Ladies Guild and the financial assistance which they had given the Board as a result of their efforts.
