REVISING THE PRAYER BOOK.—As mentioned in yesterday's Guardian, the Rev. Canon Stinson has returned to Charlottetown from Toronto, where he had been attending a meeting of the Prayer Book Revision Committee. Three years ago, this committee was appointed by the General Synod to revise the Prayer Book. The Committee divided itself on getting to work, into sub-committees to whom were given different portions of the prayer book to deal with. These sub-committees, having completed their respective tasks, reported to the General Revision Committee, who accordingly met in Toronto last week to consider these reports. With various amendments the reports were adopted. The Committee completed the revision and will present the result of their work to the General Synod which meets in Vancouver in September next. In the meantime, however, a statement which has been authorized by the Committee will be issued shortly as to the revision agreed upon by the Committee.

JUDGMENT IN IMPORTANT SUIT

other hand the respondent states the cause of her presence at Montague during the time mentioned in this way. He says in his evidence that she arranged with him to visit Montague in order to sell the furniture and other personal property and then return to Massachusetts, and live with him. The respondent's evidence in regard to the sale of the personal property is corroborated by what Mrs. Bailey actually did. There is evidence that on two occasions she called auctions and endeavored to sell the furniture, first in October, 1911, and again in April or May, 1912, shortly before her death, and his evidence is to some extent further corroborated by a statement in one of Mrs. Bailey's letters to him dated 2nd May, 1912, ten days before her death, which reads "Do you think I better sell everything but the farm, I will never sell that? What do you think I will do now?" There is further evidence by some of the witness that she said she was not going back to the respondent in Massachusetts, and by others, that Massachusetts was going back to her. Mrs. Bailey told her that when she got her business settled up she was going back to live with respondent. In one of her letters to respondent Mrs. Bailey expresses a hope that she would see him in the near future, and all her letters produced were expressed in terms of unqualified endeavours towards the respondent, manifesting a deep and abiding affection for him.

It is not clearly established by the evidence whether or not Mrs. Bailey had property in Massachusetts at the time of, or shortly before, her death. The respondent, in his evidence, says "When a widow she lived in Boston. She sold part of her property and invested here" (Montague) in Prince Edward Island. But in any case the possession of property there would not of itself necessarily affect the question of her Massachusetts domicile. In the case of In re Craigish, Craigish v. Hewitt, re Craigish, Craigish v. Hewitt, (3 Ch. Div. at p. 192), Mr. Justice Chitty in his judgment (which was confirmed on appeal) says: "A man may be in fact homeless, but he cannot be in law be without a domicile. Living in lodgings and changing the lodgings from time to time are circumstances to be taken into consideration on a question of domicile; they are not inconsistent with domicile."

That is precisely the position of the case under consideration. All that the appellants were called upon to do was to prove that Mrs. Bailey abandoned her Massachusetts domicile; but in order to do that it was necessary as the cases cited show for them to establish as a fact that she left Massachusetts with the clear intention, with the settled purpose, of leaving it permanently.

In support of the view that Mrs. Bailey abandoned her domicile of choice when she left Massachusetts reliance is placed on the fact of her ownership of land and other property at Montague, on her residence there for upwards of a year immediately before her death, on evidence that she caused preparations to be made for the cultivation of the land, and on her wish, said to have been expressed twenty years previously, that she desired to be buried near her father and mother, in the cemetery at or near Montague.
