For Councillor:

- All persons owning freehold property within the Electoral District to the value of three hundred and twenty-five dollars.
- All persons owning leasehold property within the Electoral District to the value of three hundred and twenty-five dollars.
- The wives or husbands, as the case may be, of the owners of freehold or leasehold property.
- Returned soldiers who have resided in the Province twelve months, and in the Electoral district two months previous to May 26, 1927.

Provided:

- That the property or leasehold has been in actual possession of the voter for six months previous to May 26, 1927.
- Every voter must be a British subject, and, with the exception of a returned soldier, be of the full age of twenty-one.
- Property and leasehold voters, and the wives or husbands of said voters, may vote for candidates in every Electoral district where in they have property or leasehold tenure to the value necessary and for the time required.

For Assemblyman:

- All persons qualified to vote for councillors.
- Every person, male and female, except an Indian resident of an Indian reservation, if such person:
  - Is of the full age of twenty-one years.
  - Is a British subject, and:
  - Who has resided in the Province Twelve months, and in the Electoral district two months previous to May 26, 1927.
  - Who is in actual possession, for his or her own benefit, of any freehold estate to the value of at least one hundred dollars, and has had same in actual possession for six months previous to May 26, 1927.

## IS MR. SAUNDERS SINCERE OR IS HE ONLY BLUFFING?

Those poor Parsons, how easily they are fooled! Mr. Albert C. Saunders is the man that the Rev. H. D. Raymond, Rev. W. M. Ryan, Rev. C. Ross Eaton, Rev. A. A. McLeod, and others believe to be a sincere Prohibitionist. Read for yourself again the letter from Mr. A. C. Saunders, and see how much sincerity is in it so far as Prohibition is concerned. People of Prince Edward Island, do your duty tomorrow, by registering your vote against such hypocrisy and deceit.

The following is the copy of a letter sent by Mr. Saunders, Leader of the Opposition, to his leading supporters with regard to his policy—it speaks for itself and for his palpable insincerity in espousing Prohibition:—

Summerside, P. E. I., March 21, 1927.

Dear Sir:—

Some of the executive members of the East Prince Liberal Association feel that on account of Premier Stewart's pronouncement in favor of Government Control of liquor as one of the planks in the Conservative platform at the next ensuing Provincial Election, it might be advisable to call an informal meeting in your district of some of the prominent and outstanding Party workers to consider this question, and to advise me just what course you think our Party should adopt. I think it would be advisable to have such a meeting at once, as no time should be lost.

I have reason to think that the election may be called on at an early date, possibly the middle of May. For that reason our Party must be prepared to announce its policy at an early date. I also feel that the meeting should not be too large, as it might only lead to some acrimonious discussion without any tangible results. I do, however, think it best that both sides should be well represented at such a meeting—that is, those who favor the present law and those who are opposed to it.

Kindly do not let our Conservative friends know anything about such a meeting. The Chairman of your meeting should also make it quite clear that everything should be strictly in our Party's interests and of a confidential nature. We need not remind you how carefully guarded the Conservatives kept all their discussion, and kept their own counsel. Please impress this on all who attend your meeting.

You should also bring to the attention of the meeting that our success at this election means more than on any former occasion. We will be getting at least \$160,000.00 additional subsidy, and it will simplify the work to such an extent that I am sure whichever Party succeeds on this occasion will be there for the next fifteen years. Therefore, it is of the utmost importance that you do all you reasonably can to have your meeting view the situation with an open mind, and do what you consider is in the best interests of our Party. You can then report to me that the meeting is in favor of Government Control or in favor of retaining the Prohibition Act, or are evenly divided on the question, as the case may be. This will enable me to come to what I hope may be a conclusion in the very best interests of our Party.

## Mistakes Of The Leader Of The Opposition

Mr. A. C. Saunders, the Leader of the Opposition, has made several mistakes in the campaign in his own district. He attempted to publicly apologize to Mr. Sharpe at Ellerslie when he admitted having made statements that were uncalculated for and retracted the same. Again at Tyne Valley Mr. T. A. Campbell, his associate in law and political lieutenant for Mr. Saunders, issued a challenge to Mr. Sharpe but at Emore Mr. Saunders apparently not wishing to debate this issue publicly refused to accept the challenge, stating that he was not responsible for what his lieutenant Mr. Campbell had done, and said if Mr. Saunders wishes the electors to believe that he is fitted to become a leader of a great party he had better learn now to orderly marshal all his lieutenants and show some control over them, and while his party was preaching temperance he better begin himself by giving an example of temperance in his statements and that of his colleagues, so that in the future he will not have to retract extravagant and immoderate allegations.

At the political meetings in their district, Dr. John McNeill and Mr. L. R. Allan, Liberal candidates claimed the support of the electors for their services in going to Ottawa on the delegations for the Summerside board of trade. It was understood at the time of the appointment of Mr. Creelman McArthur to the senatorship that his appointment was based on these same activities.

Both Dr. McNeill and Mr. L. R. Allan, Liberal candidates for Summerside district said at their meetings that legalized sale of liquor was "blood money," and practically in the same breath they asked the electors to elect a Liberal Govern-

## Islander Drops Dead In Hotel Room

The following clipping taken from a Fairbanks, Alaska, paper gives an account of the sudden death of Mr. Fred J. Lemon, who was a native of Montague, Prince Edward Island.

Hearing a crash against a door leading into an adjoining bathroom, Lloyd and Eugene Beckett, rooming at the Pioneer Hotel, opened it to find Fred J. Lemon on the floor dying. Hastily summoning aid they attempted to revive the stricken man but he died before a doctor could arrive. Cause of death was pronounced as heart failure.

Friends say that Mr. Lemon had never complained of being ill. James Tracy, with whom he was rooming, had brought some magazines to the room a short time before and when he left Mr. Lemon was reading. This was about half an hour before his death. It is possible that Mr. Lemon felt the attack coming on him and walked through the bathroom, which connected with both rooms, seeking aid and collapsed when he reached the Beckett's door.

Mr. Lemon was a pioneer Alaskan, living at various times at Dawson, Iditarod, Marshall, Ruby and Fairbanks. He was a mail carrier for some time in the lower River country. In the early days of the Fairbanks camp he prospected at the head of the Tanana.

Mr. Lemon returned to Fairbanks about a year ago and up until last month had been employed by the Fairbanks Exploration Co. on the creeks. He was 43 years of age. He is survived by his wife, now in Fairbanks. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.
