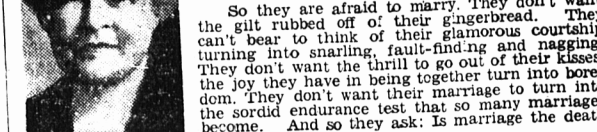

No 1 Human Weakness Causes Demise

Love That Blossoms During Courtship May Not be as Sweet in Older Age But it is Far More Lasting Than the World Generally Recognizes

A young couple ask me if marriage kills love. They say that they have seen so many of their friends, who were so beautifully and romantically in love before marriage, apparently lose all interest and even liking for each other as soon as they were married. I wonder if there is anything so poisonous in marriage that slays love; if the mere fact of two people being bound together does not automatically make them hate their fellow prisoners and long to break their fetters.



So they are afraid to marry. They don't want the gilt rubbed off of their gingerbread. They can't bear to think of their glamorous courtship turning into snoring, fault-finding and nagging. They don't want the love that they have in being together to turn into boredom. They don't want their marriage to turn into the sordid endurance test that so many marriages become. And so they ask: Is marriage the death of love?

To which I would reply: No. A thousand times no. Marriage is not the enemy of love. It is its best friend, its staunchest supporter, its strongest bulwark, its greatest promoter and always survive the treatment it gets. Sometimes it is killed by neglect, or it is starved to death, or it is slain by brutal manhandling, but it will stand more punishment than anything else on earth and still live. On every hand we see husbands and wives who have grown old ugly, fat and dull; who have been and are being crushed and hard to live with; who have fought like cats and dogs during all of their married life, but in whose hearts still burns the sacred flame they lit in their youth.

There is no more mysterious and untrue propaganda than that which teaches that there is something peculiarly beautiful and enduring about free love. No theory could be lazier. The acid test of love comes in daily association; when a man and woman undertake to live together and are dependent upon each other; when personality clashes against and personality when selfishness meets selfishness; when tastes differ and habits conflict.

It is no easier to get along with a mistress than it is with a wife. Lovens can be just as grouchy and tight-fisted as husbands. A loveness can be just as much spite as a bungalow is a respectable family neighborhood just as much as a husband is a respectable family member. And, as a matter of fact, illicit love does not last as long as the lawful variety. Plenty of married couples celebrate their golden wedding, but a liaison seldom lasts more than a very few years. Generally it is measured by months.

There are a thousand ways in which marriage promotes love instead of destroying it. One is that the mere sense of being bound to another; having made that decision that they must abide by, having entered into a contract that they are in honor bound to fulfill, settles men and women and does much to keep their fancies from roaming. They feel that they must make the best of their bargains and they set in to build up Mary and Joan in their affections until most of them become immune to sirens and seducers.

Add to this the natural human vanity involved in the sense of possession that makes each of us think that our own car, our house, our dog are better than other people's and you have another love motive. Just because a man's wife is his wife enhances her value and charm in his eyes, just because a woman's husband is her husband has been put around his head and a blanket over his faults. "A poor thing," says the old proverb, "but it's his own," and that feeling makes millions of husbands and wives dear to the men and women to whom they are married.

Most of all, husbands and wives have the strongest tie that can bind any two human beings together. They rise or fall together. They must fight the battle of life shoulder to shoulder. Everything that concerns one is of vital importance to the other. And so, every circumstance of their lives, the poe-tress this keeps them together. Every circumstance of their lives, the poetess that keeps them more interested in each other than they are in strangers and brings them closer than they are to any other human being.

And, above all, there are the children whose little hands work the miracle of love that keeps even uncongenial husbands and wives together and makes antagonistic ones forget their differences in their de-gate to the little creature they have brought into the world. Of course, many married people do cease to care for each other. But it isn't marriage that kills love. It is just human weakness and frailty and dumbness.

THE COOK'S CORNER

BASIC VANILLA CREAM
 1 cup milk
 1/2 cup milk
 1-2 cup sugar
 1 teaspoon flour
 1-8 teaspoon salt
 1 cup heavy cream
 2 teaspoon vanilla
 Method: Soak the gelatin in 2 teaspoons cold water for 5 minutes then add to the scalded milk and stir until it is dissolved. Mix and sift the sugar, salt and flour and add gradually to the mixture. Cook, stirring constantly until the mixture thickens, then add the well-beaten egg yolk.
 Beat with a rotary egg beater until very light upon milk. Beat the egg white until it is very stiff and whip the cream until it holds its shape. Fold these into the cooked mixture and add the flavoring. Turn into a mold and freeze as rapidly as possible until firm.
 The cream will be smoother if you remove it from the refrigerator or after it is partly frozen and beat thoroughly for about 2 minutes. Reset the cold control until ready to use, but not until after the cream is firm.

FRESH PINEAPPLE JAM.
 Four level cups (2 pounds) crushed or chopped fruit, 7 1-2 level cups (3 1-4 pounds) sugar, 1 bottle commercial pectin.
 Fruit very fine or, better still, run through food chopper. Measure crushed fruit into large kettle, add sugar and mix well. Cook over fire and stir constantly before and while boiling. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard for 1 minute. Remove from fire and stir in pectin. Skim, pour quickly and cover hot jam at once with hot paraffin wax.

CARROT-PINEAPPLE SALA
 Dissolve one package of prepared lemon gelatine in one cup boiling water. When slightly cooled.

 A. A teaspoonful mixture of a half cup of cold water and an excellent cleanser for black felt.
