THE Guardian has received a copy of the Illustrated Tribune, Christmas number 1907 published by P. R. Bowers of St. John's Newfoundland. It is an excellent gotten up periodical and r-f-o's much credit upon the enterprising publisher and his estimable wife who superintended the work. It has many fine half-tone illustrations, including the altar of the Catholic cathedral, groups of Anglican and Methodist clergy, the crews of sealing vessels about to leave port, the new passenger station and of many interesting local scenes, including a new view of the city. The reading matter is varied and appropriate. An article of special significance at the present time is one embodying a prophetic letter of Rev. Dr. Mullock, late Bishop of St. John's, dated November 8, 1897, setting forth the shortness of the distance between Newfoundland and the Old World and foreshadowing the wonderful telegraphic achievements which have since come to pass. The number is replete with interest and reflects high credit upon the enterprise of Mr. Bowers and upon the beautiful city of St. John's.

THE congregation of St. Mark's Church Kensington gave a pleasant supper to the Rev. J. A. and Mrs. Winfield on Monday night. The Rectory was well filled with people all of which seemed determined to make the evening enjoyable. Music, singing, and games were indulged in till a late hour. During the evening a very elaborate address was read and presented to the Rector, testifying to the great esteem in which he was held not only by his own people, but by the community in general also referring to the great work he had accomplished in the parish in the face of many difficulties, likewise of the happy and cordial relations between pastor and people. Mrs. Winfield also came in for congratulations for her interest in parish work. During the address the Rev. gentleman was asked to accept the accompanying purse as a slight token of love and esteem. Mr. Winfield replied in a most happy manner, saying that it was very gratifying to see names other than his own people on the address. Refreshment was then served and one of the happiest and pleasant of evenings was brought to a close, the people leaving behind many evidences of their good will.

OUR efficient Fire Department, with a number of veterans who served in former days, were dined at the Rivers Hotel last night by the popular chef, Charles Hermans. The dining hall was beautifully decorated with bunting etc, and the menu prepared by the hostess Mrs. Brown was up to the high standard that she has established in former years. At nine o'clock about sixty guests sat down to the tables. After satisfying the inner man, speeches songs and recitations passed away the time till midnight when the company broke up after singing Auld Lang Syne and the National Anthem.

YESTERDAY afternoon the police raided a saloon kept on Queen Street by Emmet McGuigan, arrested him and later made a seizure of his stock in trade. This man, whose name could not be ascertained for some time, it will be remembered was convicted of a breach of the Prohibitory Law, imprisoned in the County Jail and afterwards released by Mr. Justice Hodgson. After obtaining his freedom he removed from his old stand on Richmond street and opened a new bar on Queen street opposite the Telephone Office. He commenced a brisk trade but it was short lived. Prosecutor Campbell entered the bar yesterday afternoon, found him selling liquor and immediately swore out a warrant for his arrest. He was taken in custody, and shortly afterwards, armed with a search warrant procured by Prosecutor Campbell the officers again went to his place of business and seized his stock consisting of a number of cases and bottles of liquor. He will be put on trial this morning for breach of the Prohibitory Law.
