 In the art exhibit, one may single out for special mention several excellent paintings in the professional class by Miss Mary Dowell. There is a very lovely painting in oils by Miss Mercer of Montreal. It depicts a lady seated by a spinning wheel, and is especially remarkable for the excellent way in which the light is arranged.  
 There here is a lovely landscape by Miss George Read, of Borden, and an exquisite still life--a vase of flowers--by the same talented young artist.  
 In pencil, there is an excellent copy of the Venus de Milo by Miss Adrienne Perry of Summerside, winner of first money in its class.  
 In pencil also are two portraits--one of Abraham Lincoln, the other of Robert Burns, the latter being awarded a special first prize by the work of a patient at Falconwood Hospital.  
 Quite noteworthy also is a portrait in oils, done by Mrs. P. E. Keeping, of Charlottetown. The winner of the second prize in the same class--the portrait of a Nun by Miss Ethel Mitchell, of Montreal, is also worthy of very special mention.  
 Some lovely wood carving and clay modelling by Mrs. MacCoubrey of Summerside, were much admired, both winning first prizes.  
 In the fancy Art department there is a very lovely coolie coat, decorated in the new fabric paints, the work of Mrs. Walter Bluns. This exhibit received a first prize in its class.  
 Another example that was much admired consisted of a wall panel, decorated with the picture of an antique vessel. Come in the newer fabric paints by Mrs. G. E. Keeping.  
 Many lovely examples of cut work and cross stitch embroidery were noted, one in each of these styles by Mrs. Coesman winning a first prize.  
 A very striking example of Batik work done in silk was exhibited by Miss Mary MacDonald.  
 A much admired piece among the hooked mats and squares was that done by Mrs. Margaret Heathcote, New Wiltshire.
