THE GUARDIAN has received from Mr. L. E. Prowse, of Prowse Bros. and Crowell a souvenir of Sydney's great fire which occurred on Saturday, October 19th, 1901. The collection consists of nine selected photographs taken during and after the conflagration. During the blaze sixty seven buildings were destroyed, thirty one families made homeless with a total loss amounted to over \$300,000; total amount of insurance paid about \$250,000. The first view in the souvenir gives the beginning of the fire taken at about 2 o'clock in the afternoon. The other views were taken after the fire, giving an excellent idea of the destruction as viewed from the northern corner of Charlotte and Pitts' Sts., looking south east; southern limits of the fire districts; view from Wentworth Street, south east corner of Charlotte and Prince streets, giving an excellent view of the ruins of Prowse Bros & Crowell's building; ruins from Bentinck street; Charlotte street looking north, showing the northwestern limits of the fire; doing business at the old stand a butcher attending to his customers under difficulties and Prowse Bros & Crowell's Big Departmental shack 12 days after the fire.
