

The following write-up is from the New Glasgow Evening News of Feb. 5th:—
 Sunday was a great day for the people of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. A well filled church greeted the speaker of the day, Rev. M. Scott Fulton, at the morning service. Mr. Fulton is a man of unusual gifts, possessing a very genial and attractive personality, an exceptionally fine sense of humor, combined with a deep insight into the things of the spirit. His message in the morning, entitled, "A poisonous heresy," was a masterful exposition of the epistle of Colossians, in which Christ in all things had the pre-eminence.
 At the evening service the church was packed to the doors to hear Mr. Fulton at his best in his challenging message, "Choosing and Being Chosen." He dealt with a typically Presbyterian theme of God's sovereignty and a man's free will, showing from a practical point of view that God does choose His workmen, and yet presenting the challenge to every one present to "choose ye this day whom ye will serve," for the opportunity is ours.
 A large number of people were present from Stellarton, as well as New Glasgow, showing the high esteem in which Mr. Fulton is held by those among whom he ministered some years ago. Mr. Fulton also spoke to the Bible Class and Sunday School and his message will not be forgotten for months to come.

directors tomorrow, will be immediately laid before Hon. C. A. Manning, Minister of Railways and Canals, at Ottawa for action this session.

A series of conferences have been taking place, beginning early in January, between the officers of the Canadian National and the Canadian Pacific Railways with a view to arriving at agreements regarding certain lines in territories where the plans of the two companies appeared to conflict. While no official announcement has been made regarding these conferences it is understood agreements have been arrived at covering several of the questions which threatened to bring about railway development.

In Nova Scotia it is proposed to construct a line 67 miles in length to open up the local territory between Sunny Brae and Guysboro for the lumber industry and to provide better transportation facilities for agricultural and fishery produce. As part of the program for complete standardization of the track gauges in Prince Edward Island a new line will be built 10 miles in length between Lake Verde and Pisquid, P. E. I., is proposed.

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 10.—The local and foreign demand for Canadian grain here Saturday was quiet but values for all lines were well maintained. The trade in spring and winter wheat flour was of a limited character but prices were unchanged. The undertone to the millfeed market continued firm under a good demand from local and United States buyers. Standard grades of rolled oats were steady. A moderately active business was done in eggs and prices were firmly maintained. Receipts were Saturday 4,802 cases. Owing to the limited supplies available and the good demand the undertone to the butter market continued firm. Receipts were 40 packages. The tone of the cheese market was steady but the volume of business was small. Receipts were 161 boxes. The bean market was steady. Canadian handpicked sold at \$5.75 per bushel, while yellow eye and brown beans were quoted at \$5.00 per bushel. The inquiry for potatoes continued good and values were about steady.

The funeral of the late Hon. John H. Bell was held on Saturday from his late home, the residence of Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Island's most gifted sons who was at all times faithful to his duty in the service of his country.
 Ex-Premier Bell was of upright and sterling character and both at home and abroad was held in the highest esteem by all. During a well rounded life he never wavered in his attention to duty and in his passing this province will long feel his loss.
 The funeral service was conducted by Rev. J. P. C. Fraser, assisted by Rev. C. J. St. Clair Jeans. There was a short service at the home, and thence to Trinity United Church. During the service a very beautiful solo, "There is a Beautiful Land on High," was rendered by request by Mrs. A. E. MacPhail, of Camrose, Alta., nee Miss Alfreda Compton of Summerside.
 The honorary pall bearers were Senator MacArthur, Mr. A. E. MacLean, M. P., Chief Justice Matheson, Premier A. C. Saunders, Hon. W. M. Lea and Hon. J. H. Myers. The active pall bearers were: Hon. James McIntyre, Dr. J. F. McNeill, Mr. A. S. McKay, Dr. A. W. Leard, Mr. C. R. Rogers and Mr. E. W. Manson.

worlds are ever opening to us, and no matter how old we are, or how great our achievements, all of us are always discoverers.
 Religion in itself is a great adventure in which God is calling us to new spiritual dominions.
 And in our earthly life we are learning more of the vast and wonderful universe about us, giving us ever more sublime revelations of God the Creator. We are called, too, to new worlds of power and achievement, as witnessed by advances made in such material things as radio, aeroplanes, and all the growing list of inventions which minister to our wants.
 We may glimpse the vision of a new world, too, in Christian thought and life. Religion's emphasis is changing from the literal to the spiritual. It is shown forth now not so much in creeds as in deeds—not in rites and forms, but in the living spirit of Jesus, Christianity is Christ-likeness.
 There is a new world of humanity coming, too, said the speaker. This is evidenced by the rise of the masses, the labor movement and the great thirst for knowledge among the people.
 Then, too, the spirit of nationalism which we see rising among the peoples of the east and the rapid spread of the suffrage show to us that the people are at last coming into the own.
 So that, among the creeds we see the new world of inter-denominationalism and among the nations the new world of internationalism.
 Then, finally for us all comes the great world which lies beyond the great adventure of death.
 The subject of the evening sermon was The Two Great Facts of Life.
 We need God—
 God needs us.
 In the course of his address, Mr. Eaton stressed the need we have of God. To us He is an intellectual, physical and moral necessity. He is the only complete satisfaction, too, for our emotional, and social needs, and He is the one and only complete fulfillment of our aspirations towards the ideal and the eternal.
 God needs us, too, said the speaker. In closing, he emphasized the necessity of love of God and of our fellowmen, and of labour, too, if we would find the truest and most divine happiness.
 The music at both services was of most outstanding merit. Miss Barbara McNeill, soprano, sang "The Holy Hour" most expressively. Mr. Quigley's clear tenor voice was heard to excellent advantage in the solo from "Seek Ye the Lord."
 Tennyson's "Crossing the Bar" in Wagner's setting received a masterly interpretation in Mr. V. L. Dingwell's richly melodious baritone.
 Revs. H. D. Raymond, Dr. E. H. Ramsay and H. Johnson, coming in at the close of the service, spoke happily and feelingly of their appreciation of Mr. Eaton and their good wishes for his future.

RADIO COMMUNICATION
DARTMOUTH, Mass., Feb. 10.—Direct two-way communication by radio spanning 9,000 miles was carried on yesterday between the supply ship Eleanor Bolling of the Byrd Antarctic expedition and the research radio station of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Round Hills. The Eleanor Bolling reported she was 1,040 miles southeast of Dunedin, New Zealand, and was bound for that port after having taken on 80 tons of coal from the steamer C. A. Larsen. All aboard were reported well and happy. The Eleanor Bolling expects to reach Dunedin next Thursday and after taking on a cargo of tractors, gasoline, kerosene and coal is scheduled to sail February 16, on her third voyage to the ice barrier.

of Milan, was designated to the chair of St. Peter by the Conclave of February 1922, when he became the 261st Pope, under the name of Pius XI. The noble desire to obtain "the peace of Christ through the reign of Christ" has inspired his pastoral activity. To the various manifestations of social error that have cropped up in the world, the Pontiff has opposed the constant doctrine of the Church, and maintains that the social question is governed by the religious question. Recent pontifical interventions have cast out, as contrary to doctrinal teaching, an aggregation of pagan ideas concerning the Church, human nature, society and morals, which the Pope designates as "moral, juridical and social modernism." The Papal directions regarding the catechism, the formation of youth in Seminaries, the development of Biblical and Oriental studies and sacred archeology, are instanced as so many witnesses to an ever vigilant zeal.
 Mention is also made of the growth of the Catholic Church resulting from the efforts of Missions under the powerful incentive of the Pope. From the Far East as well as from Equatorial Africa, these activities are reported. The sons of the yellow and black races are admitted to the priesthood; they attain the higher ranks of the ecclesiastical hierarchy; and the venerable hands of the Pontiff consecrate native bishops for China and Japan. Brethren separated from the Church by schism and heresy have not been excluded from the pontifical solicitude. The grace of unity has been beseeched, and all peoples have been invited to live in fraternal charity under the sceptre of Christ the King.
 The Letter concludes with an appeal to the filial piety and generosity of Roman Catholics throughout Canada in connection with the forthcoming jubilee.
