The farm property known as "Westwood" has been leased for two years (not purchased) by J. M. Wiley, Manager of the Dominion Packing Company, W. H. Hankin, the owner, will divide his time between Charlottetown, Sydney, Ontario and St. Louis.

The case against Ernest and Angus Chapman for the brutal assault on Edgar McCarron, Sunday morning, came up at the Police Court yesterday and owing to the condition of the victim was adjourned till Wednesday. McCarron had five stitches put in one cut and four in the other. Both eyes are badly bruised, out of one he cannot see, his nose is broken and his body is badly bruised. McCarron is known to the police as a harmless man somewhat addicted to drink but unoffensive. Chapman have not previously come under the notice of the police. To all appearances the assault was entirely unprovoked.

The team to represent Canada for the Palma trophy contest has been chosen at Hsley and includes Capt. J. M. Jones, P. E. I., as one of the eight. The selection was made Thursday and there was exceedingly keen competition for places. Lieut. Colonel Sherwood, the commandant of the Canadian Hsley team said that it was hard to choose whom all were so good. The Palma trophy contest is exciting even greater enthusiasm than the King's prize contest. Up to the present the Americans have shown the best form in practice.

CONSIDERABLE anxiety is felt here today, particularly by those interested in live stock, on account of a report being circulated to the effect; That Dr. Pethick the Veterinary expert who was sent here by the Department of Agriculture at the request of John McLean M. L. A. to investigate the peculiar cattle disease which has caused much loss this season, has decided that the disease is Hepatic Cholera. In other words that he has discovered the existence of Pictou county cattle disease in eastern King's County. If this report is true, it seems strange that this mysterious disease which for the past forty years has been confined to Pictou and Antigonish counties, should now appear in this new territory. Yet we must admit that there is small hope of Dr. Pethick being mistaken in his diagnosis. He has had special training in this kind of work together with much experience and we understand has held several post mortem examinations that have died in the vicinity of Bourke.
