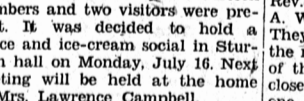

Meeting Of Presbytery of Of P. E. Island

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in regular session in Zion Church Hall, Charlottetown at 11 a. m. on Tuesday, July 24th. The Moderator, Rev. Andrew Brown, Tyne Valley, presided and opened the meeting in due form. Those present were: Rev. Andrew Brown, Moderator; Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, Clerk; Rev. Donald McLean, Rev. W. Bruce Muir, Rev. Quincy A. McDowell, Rev. Chas. J. Mt. Clair, Rev. Thos. R. Rodger, Rev. M. A. Genge, D.D., Rev. D. V. O'Meara, Rev. F. G. McIntosh, Messrs J. H. Bergen, N. E. Barnett, and H. A. Dolg, student catechists and Messrs. Neil McKay, Arch. McPherson, Samuel McPherson, W. A. Martin, Wm. Doherty, J. F. Profit, Douglas Jardine, James Jardine, Andrew McNeill, D. M. Bernard, A. A. McNeill, Geo. Paynter, Alex. Hiltz, Dr. A. J. Murchison, Geddie Douglas, A. W. Hyndman, Wellington Johnston, Chas. K. Martin, Daniel Quinn, and Mr. S. P. Dougherty representative layman.

Rev. F. G. McIntosh, superintendent of missions for the Presbyterian Church in the Maritime Provinces was present and was asked to sit and correspond.

Mr. McIntosh gave a short address. He told of the splendid strides the Presbyterian Church had made during the past year.

Mr. J. Marshall Sproul, the headmaster of the Presbyterian Collegiate School, Pictou, was also present and gave a brief account of the good work being done in this Sunday school. Mr. Sproul is at present touring P. E. Island securing boys for this school. Already quite a number are planning to attend early in September.

The Moderator, Rev. Andrew Brown, extended a hearty welcome to the student catechists Messrs. J. H. Bergen, N. E. Barnett and H. A. Dolg, who were present at the Presbytery meeting. It was moved, seconded and carried unanimously that the sympathy of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island be extended to the parents of Mr. H. A. Hill, B.A., Carthage, Mo., and to the mother of Mr. George Harris of Halifax—the two young divinely students who were drowned in Alberton on Wednesday, July 18th.

Three of the four commissioners who had attended the meeting of the General Assembly in Regina in June namely, Rev. Scott Fulton, Rev. Quincy A. McDowell and Mr. A. W. Hyndman gave brief reports. They all spoke of how encouraging the reports coming in from all parts of the church were. "The year just closed had been a very successful one."

The clerk read a notice from the Rev. D. A. McKay, clerk of the Halifax and Lunenburg Presbytery stating that a call to Rev. Andrew Brown of Tyne Valley would be dealt with pro re nata meeting of said Presbytery on Monday, July 30th and provisional arrangements would be made for Mr. Brown's induction.

A hearty and quite unanimous call from the Malpeque congregation addressed to Rev. Fred Williamson was presented by the representative elder Mr. Andrew McNeill. The call was signed by sixty members and seventy one adherents and accompanied with a guarantee of twelve hundred dollars and the regular holidays.

On motion the call was sustained at a regular gospel call and personal arrangements were made for the induction of Mr. Williamson.

At the induction service Rev. R. H. Stavert, Moderator of the Malpeque session will preside.

Rev. Thomas A. Rodger will preach. Rev. Andrew Brown, Moderator of Presbytery will induct Rev. W. Bruce Muir will address the newly inducted minister and Rev. M. Scott Fulton the people of the congregation. In the event of Mr. Williamson accepting the call, the induction will be held on the evening of Wednesday, August 8th at 8 o'clock.

The appointment of Rev. D. V. O'Meara to the Murray Harbor North and Peters Road congregation will terminate on July 29th. Mr. Harry A. Scheidtmann, the student of Murray Harbor South, was appointed to supply Murray Harbor North and Peters Road until the re-opening of college.

Rev. M. E. Genge, D. D., who has been supplying the pulpit of Montague, Cardigan and Dundas for over a year having intimated to the

people of this pastoral charge that he had received a call to a congregation in the United States it was agreed to separate the congregation of Montague from the other two sections of this pastoral charge so that Montague could call a minister of their own. This was accordingly done. Later the other two sections, Cardigan and Dundas were formed into a separate congregation and also given the privilege to call a minister for themselves.

The members of the Presbytery spoke in glowing terms of the work done by Dr. Genge in the two pastoral charges in which he had labored since the days of the disruption, namely, Kensington, Malpeque and Freetown and Montague, Cardigan and Dundas and it was agreed to place on record appreciation of the splendid service rendered to the Presbyterian Church by Rev. Dr. Genge. Dr. Genge spoke very feelingly in responding to this expression of appreciation of this work.

The Presbytery nominated Rev. W. Bruce Muir as Moderator of the Maritime Synod which is to meet in Charlottetown on Tuesday, Oct. 2nd.

A committee consisting of the Moderator of the Presbytery, Rev. Andrew Brown, the Clerk of Presbytery, Rev. R. Hensley Stavert and Rev. W. Bruce Muir and Rev. M. Scott Fulton were appointed to make arrangements for the entertaining of the delegates to the Synod.

The Clerk reported that Miss Anna Rogers, the Deaconess who has been working in the Dundas congregation under the auspices of the W. M. Society would complete her work there next week and would then be ready for work in other congregations. He asked that all congregations needing the assistance of Miss Rogers by way of leading Women's Missionary Societies or Mission Bands or C. G. I. T. Groups organized would acquaint him of the fact at the earliest possible date. While the Presbytery is supporting Miss Rogers the direction of the work is under the Presbytery.

Mr. Stavert also made an appeal to the members of the Presbytery to do all in their power to have as many of their young people as possible attend the summer school and missionary conference being held at Canoe Cove, Aug. 6th-13th. All young people over sixteen years of age together with all clergymen, students, catechists, superintendents and teachers of Sunday School and all missionary workers and leaders are urged to attend.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator and Clerk of which public intimation was made and the meeting closed with the benediction by the Moderator, Rev. Andrew Brown.

Miss Stevenson taught in Northam during the past year, and was efficient and painstaking, as was shown by the half-yearly examination on June 29. On this occasion a large number of parents and visitors spent a very pleasant afternoon. After the pupils had been examined in the different subjects, a neat sum of money was presented to the teacher and a complimentary address was read, to which Miss Stevenson feelingly replied. A very pleasant item on the program was the treat of ice-cream and cake which the teacher had provided for all. Complimentary remarks were made by those present and a vote of thanks was tendered Miss Stevenson. Following is the address: Dear Teacher,—Another school closing is at hand and we are again called upon to say good-bye to a

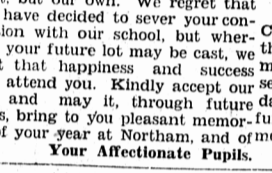

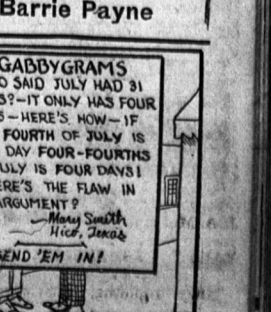
