Had the Stanford-Army and Southern California's games with Carnegie Tech and Pittsburgh been played while the All-American pickers were engaged in their 1929 studies, how could Chuck Smalling, Russ Saunders and at least four or five others be kept off the first two A-A teams?

The great Chris Cagle tried valiantly but with utter futility to wreck Stanford's stonewall defenses. West Point held Notre Dame to a light 7-0 score, but "Pop" Warner's Cardinals crashed Army for 34 points. Fullback Smalling reducing the game Cadets to bowling pin candes compared to arc lights when "Race Horse Russ" and Duffield (just to cite two of the Trojan backfield got going New Year's Day) Smalling, Saunders, Duffield, et al were not flashes in the pan; they were good all season and blazed their brightest in their teams' inter-sectionals, which came too late, alas, for 1929 A-A consideration.

At that, those football greats are not so hard hit by fate as Frank Shellenbach, Pacific Coast League pitching ace. Because this "Shell" fires the spit ball, banned by the major leagues, he cannot get into the big show.
