Pale blondes appear more fragile than Fragonard shepherdesses when they dress consistently in pastel shades. Brunettes snap the imagination to attention when dressed in vivid rich colors, or in stark white.

### COOL DARK DRESS GOOD SUMMER BET

**NEW YORK**—The uncertain days of early summer demand something special, a dress that will look right if it turns cool enough to wear a coat, or one that will look right on a warm day without a coat.

A practical answer to this problem is a dark but cool dress, a spun rayon that makes a good ap-

### Cook's Corner

#### MINTED CHEESE CANAPES

1 tablespoon chopped mint leaves  
4 tablespoons cream cheese  
Few grains salt  
Salty crackers  
Chop mint leaves very fine and add cream cheese and salt. Spread thickly on salty crackers. Garnish with tiny bits of mint.

#### BAKED SWEETBREADS WITH CHEESE

1 pair sweetbreads  
Cold water  
1 tablespoon salt  
1 tablespoon vinegar  
Grated Parmesan cheese  
1/2 pound mushrooms  
Salt  
Paprika  
Toast  
Soak sweetbreads in cold water for 20 minutes. Drain. Place in saucepan with cold water to cover. Add salt and vinegar and cook gently 20 minutes. Chill in cold water and discard tubes and membrane. Toast bread on one side. Sprinkle generously with grated Parmesan cheese seasoned with salt and paprika. Cover with parboiled sweetbread. Pan fry mushroom caps and cover sweetbreads with them. Pour enough cream in baking dish to nearly cover bottom, then place the toast slices in baking dish. Cover tightly and bake eight minutes at 350 degrees. Serve at once in the same dish.

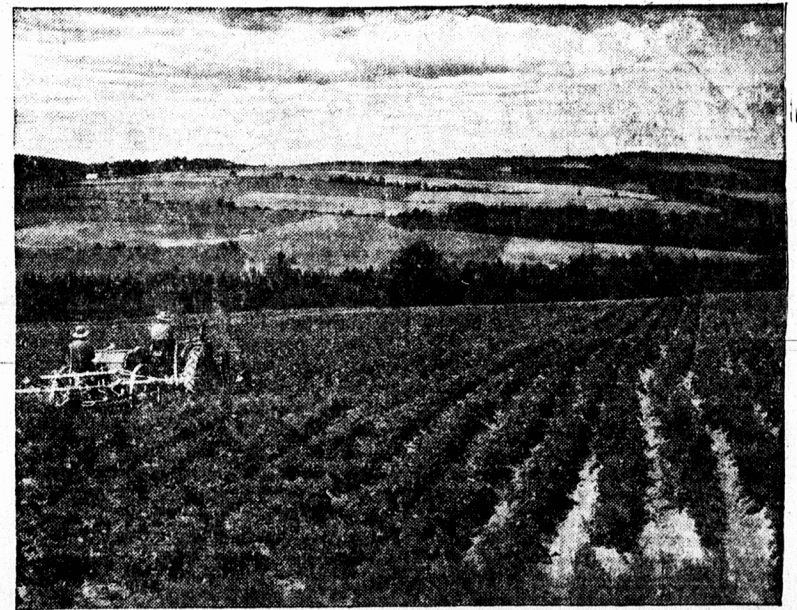
When all is still and silent
