Attracting Books Throw New Light On Huronia Story

The search for the site of St. Ignace, scene of the martyrdom of the Jesuit fathers, Brebeuf and Lalemant on March 16, 1649, has gone on for more than 100 years. The story of establishing the exact location of such a significant place in Canadian history is recounted in "St. Ignace, Canadian Altar of Martyrdom" (McClelland and Stewart) by Dr. William Sherwood Fox, former president of the University of Western Ontario.

Dr. Fox's book is a model of clarity and scholarship. Even for those already familiar with the history of the Huron missions, the summary in the first part of the book is a welcome review. The major part of the book, detailing the search for St. Ignace, is done so well that the lay reader following step by step learns not only of the finding of the fort, but comes to understand the problems peculiar to historical research on the spot.

TO STAND on that ground, and know it, has the same effect on the heart of a pilgrim as to kneel before the altar in a hallowed sanctuary. Canadian people who love their country and its traditions are in debt to the efforts of the archaeologists and to the enthusiasm of scholars like Dr. Fox, who have been making us thus aware of our national heritage.

IN "SAINT AMONG THE HURONS" (Harper) Francis X. Talbot of the Society of Jesus tells the gripping story of Father Jean de Brebeuf, the saintly Norman priest who took the Christian message to the Huron Indians of Ontario and died a martyr's death at the hands of the Iroquois.

FATHER TALBOT'S book is the first detailed account in English of the life and missionary exploits of one of the eight Jesuit North American martyrs who were raised to sainthood with their canonization June 29, 1930. The book's publication coincides with the 300th anniversary of Father Brebeuf's martyrdom in 1649—the year that assaults by the Iroquois from the south shore of Lake Ontario virtually wiped out the Hurons and dispersed them from their homeland on Georgian Bay in the vicinity of the present town of Midland.

FATHER TALBOT devotes most of his work to the life of Father Brebeuf. He gives his account perspective by linking Brebeuf's career with the early history of New France with the work among the Indians of the other seven martyrs—Fathers St. Isaac Jogues, St. Antoine Daniel, St. Gabriel Lalemant, St. Charles Garnier, St. Noel Chabanel, St. Rene Goupil and St. Jean Lande.

Now his best chance is an indoor fight in a stadium which will hold only about one-fifth that many spectators.
