MINISTER RESIGNS—Rev. J. C. Spurr, who is well known in this province, has resigned the pastoral care of the Debert, Great Village and Acadia Mines Baptist Churches to take effect October 1st, after five years service. He goes to Hantsport to visit for a time.

A RUNAWAY—Saturday afternoon, shortly before six, a horse driven by a lady, became frightened and ran away, dashing up Grafton it took a short cut through the market square and continued on its mad career until reaching a stable somewhere on Richmond street. The carriage was badly broken but fortunately the horse was not injured.

POTATO EXPORTING—With the enactment of the democratic tariff reducing the duty on potatoes is a matter of perhaps a few weeks only, plans are being completed for the shipment of a traffic between Prince Edward Island and the United States that has been dormant of late years. The schooner Glyndon, now at New York says a Halifax Exchange; loading anthracite for the Dartmouth Coal and Supply company, will be the first vessel to carry a cargo in this revived trade, her destination being probably Bridgeport. Formerly a large fleet of schooners plied between Prince Edward Island and New England bringing potatoes South, chiefly to Portsmouth and Boston, but the trade was abolished by increased duties. So that the islanders will have a special interest in the outcome of the tariff bill, the passing of which seems an absolute certainty.

ROAD RACE.—It has been decided to hold the twenty-mile bicycle race for the Dunlop trophy, under the auspices of the St. John Lodge of Moose, on Wednesday, October 8, when there will also be a ten-mile road race says a St. John exchange. Winchester, of Charlottetown, who has twice won the bicycle trophy, will again compete, and other entries which are understood to be assured are those of Oulton, of Amherst; Cochrane, of Bloomfield, and Gallet, of St. John. It is not yet known whether there will be any entry from Halifax in the bicycle race, but a group of runners for the ten mile race are expected from that city. Rogers, of Charlottetown, will also come, and Chambers, of St. John, who won the Labor Day race in Moncton, will complete. In the evening, after the races, the competitors will be entertained by the Moose at their home.

The Attorney-General has instructed the librarian to secure copies of the Canadian Immigration Laws and the laws affecting gambling. Each deputy attorney-general will be required to acquaint himself with these statutes.
