Theological Convocation of Mt. Allison University

The 62nd Convocation of the Theological College of Mount Allison University was held in the Methodist Church on Friday evening before a capacity audience.

The service opened with "Venite, exultemus Dominum" after which the Rev. F. E. Barrett, President of the Nova Scotia Conference led in prayer.

The degree of Bachelor of Divinity was then conferred upon Harold S. Bishop, B. A., Kentville, N. S., and certificates in Theology to the following:

Dr. George Trueman, President of the University, in a brief address to the six graduates emphasized the sacredness of the Christian Ministry. The Minister is different from other men; not alone a good mixer, but he is a priest as well as a man.

The dean of the Theological Faculty, the Rev. W. G. Watson, B. A., D.D., then made a brief report for the year. There were thirty students registered in the department during the past year of which twenty-eight were in residence and two extra-mural. Of those in residence two were graduates in Arts, eighteen undergraduates and eight students on the ordinary course.

Geographically eleven were from Newfoundland, nine from New Brunswick and four from Nova Scotia.

The prize list is as follows: The John Sealy Prize for highest standing in Church History awarded to Samuel I. Murley.

The Rebecca Star Scholarship for highest average standing in the work of the whole course awarded to Samuel I. Murley.

The Charles H. Paisley Scholarship for the highest standing in New Testament Greek awarded to John Barbour.

A special prize for the highest standing in Systematic Theology awarded to John T. Clarke.

The Russell Baskin Memorial prize for highest standing in Religious Education awarded to Harold S. Bishop, B. A.

The address was then delivered to the graduating class by the Rev. Professor James Moffatt, D. D., D. Litt., of the United Free Church College Glasgow, Scotland. Dr. Moffatt is famous as a translator of both the Old and New Testaments, in addition to having written a great many books of a Theological nature.

Woodman's Anthem "Thus Saith the Lord" was beautifully rendered by a Union choir under direction of Miss Hanson of the Ladies' College after which Dr. Curtis, Superintendent of Education for Newfoundland pronounced the benediction.

Alleged Verses of Prince Read On Crossing Line LONDON, April 26.—An unauthenticated version of the verses which the Prince of Wales recited on the battle cruiser Repulse as the warship bearing him down the African coast from Lagos crossed the equator yesterday, is in circulation in London today.

Catching the spirit of the festive occasion when Father Neptune during the ceremony presented an address of congratulatory to the Prince the hand of his "daughter" a green-gowned sailor lady, with a "fighting" face the Prince responded with a verse:

"Missing from the yesterday's dispatch the verse were reported to have been received subsequently from the Repulse by wireless. As published here, they read:

"I thank you for your kind suggestion, About your beautiful princess But may I ask you just one question 'Where in hell did she get that dress?'"

In spite of all I'm forced to spurn her, Though your offer makes me proud. Yes, my king I must return her Pets on board are not allowed."

No official confirmation of this version of the Prince's poetic contribution to the Father Neptune festivities aboard the Repulse was obtainable here.

WORKS AMONG NEW CANADIANS The Red Cross Nursery at Sand Point, has been closed for this season according to a despatch from St. John, N. B. Miss V. A. Tremaine, R.
