

VEGETARIAN EXPERT BANS MILK AND EGGS

LONDON, June 2.—Milk drinkers are only cows in human form. Dr. Stavros Damoglu, Greek vegetarian physician and resident of London, told the International Vegetarian Union at Central Hall in Westminster Saturday. He placed both milk and eggs on his list of banned articles of food.

"I would say without fear of contradiction that any one who indulges in large quantities of cow's milk develops the brains and mentality of a cow and is only a cow in human form," said the vegetarian apostle. "Is there any greater centre of infection and disease than eggs?"

Dr. Scott To Be Honored

At the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada.

(By a Special Correspondent.)
MONTREAL, June 1.—One of the most interesting functions of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada which convenes in Knox-Crescent Church, Montreal, on Wednesday evening, will be the celebration of the jubilee of the Rev. Dr. Ephraim Scott, Dr. Scott, who has filled the moderatorial office during this most wonderful year, has attained his fiftieth year as a minister of the Church. Although now past the four-score years he is as vigorous of body and alert of mind as many a man twenty years younger. Even now he is acknowledged as the one man who has guided and will continue to guide the destinies of the Church. As editor of the Presbyterian Record his voice goes forth every month to the uttermost parts of the land. From Newfoundland to the most remote regions of the Yukon, it is the voice of Dr. Scott that gives inspiration to every genuine Presbyterian heart. Having filled many other important offices in the Church, he has touched the Church's life at every point, and now, in this his jubilee year, he is to be honored as never before. An illuminated address is to be presented to him and eloquent testimony borne to the great services he has rendered. It will be an interesting moment when the hero of a hundred fights is thus honored. The Third of June will see the Commissioners settling down to steady business. The amount of work to be got through in this Parliament of the Church is enormous, but the expeditionness in which it will be accomplished might show an example to parliaments in another sphere. Happily there will not be much of a controversial matter, although Presbyterians have always recognized that without controversy truth cannot be established. This year, however, the watchword will be "Excelsior" and nothing to mar the upward march is likely to prevail for very long. The Centenary Church now has two colleges—Knox College in Toronto and The College in Montreal. Their staffs have been depleted by the disruption, and several appointments require to be made to the vacant chairs. The Rev. Principal Fraser will remain head of The

Montreal College, but a new Principal must be appointed for Knox College. 
