MANY KILLED BY EARTHQUAKE

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 22.—The town of Acambay, in the northern part of the state of Mexico, is practically in ruins as a result of the earthquake there on Tuesday. Fifty-nine bodies have been removed from the ruins of a church and other buildings. Many more are still buried in the wreckage. The injured will number a hundred. Scarcely a house or public building is standing intact.

At various other places in the same district, the reports tell of devastation and death.

At Tlaxcala, nine persons were killed and 20 injured.

At Atlacomulco three persons were killed.

There was only slight property damage at Eloro and only one child was killed.

Harry McKenzie, aged 23, who had both legs broken on Tuesday night at the works at Courtenay Bay, died Wednesday night in the General Public Hospital. Mr. McKenzie belongs to Murray River, P. E. I., and had been employed with the Courtenay Bay Construction Company for some time. A heavy stone crushed both his legs above the ankles. This is the first death at the Courtenay Bay works.—St. John Exc.

In Charlottetown Thursday judgment was given in the case of Interpleader of Bruce Stewart & Co., claimant in the suit of Toombs and another vs. Block, the claimant claiming goods under an absent debtor attachment. Mr. Justice Fitzgerald handed down a written judgment dismissing the summons with costs to the sheriff. D. A. McKinnon appeared for the claimant, C. G. Duffy for the judgment creditors and W. S. Stewart, K. C., for the Sheriff.

A shipment of foxes was brought to the city to-day on the Montreal train from western Canada, being consigned to a fox-raucher in P. E. Island. They attracted much attention, but still greater interest was centered upon them when one of their number, a little before the C. P. R. pulled out for the east, the animal ran through the train shed and was allowed by several men employed about the place. After a little it was captured near the door of the coachman's stand by Chris Nichols who bore it back in triumph to its car home.—St. John Exc.

His many friends will be shocked to hear of the death of Willis Taylor, Charlottetown, which occurred at 7.30 last night. Mr. Taylor had been suffering with asthma for some years, but it never seriously affected his health until about a week ago, when bronchitis set in, culminating in his demise at the age of 54. The deceased had his wife and family have resided in Charlottetown for the past twelve years, having removed here from Newfoundland, and during this time he has been janitor of the First Methodist Church, Charlottetown, in which position he proved to be a faithful and painstaking caretaker. He was a man of exemplary character, quiet and unassuming in disposition. He leaves to mourn the loss of a loving husband and a kind and affectionate father, his wife (nee Miss Helena Harwood), three sons, George, in Valparaiso, Harry and Joseph at home, and two daughters, Mary and Gladys, both at home, also an adopted son, James, at home, to all of whom the Guardian extends sincere sympathy. The funeral notice will appear later.

Thompson of Pictou, returned missionary from Trinidad, in St. James' Hall last evening, under the auspices of the W. F. and H. M. S. Mrs. Thompson told of the work in the West Indies for the past 48 years, a work with which she is thoroughly conversant having grown up with it. As is well known, Mrs. Thompson is a daughter of the Rev. Dr. Morton, whose missionary work is a household word in Prince Edward Island. Mrs. Thompson told her appealing and intensely interesting story in a most convincing manner and the great need of more help in the mission fields of the world was touchingly brought home to her hearers. Mr. Fullerton, who acted as chairman, expressed the pleasure it was to have Mrs. Thompson present and handed down with a missionary hymn and the benediction.

A voyage of hardship amid sleet and snowy blizzards, when her aged sapper declared she had the closest call of her career wended as the three-masted schooner Empress, of Charlottetown (P. E. I.), dropped anchor in the upper harbor yesterday after a twelve-day passage from Jacques river (N. B.). She left the Brunswick port Nov. 7, and in the Bay of Chaleur ran into a terrific northeasterly blizzard that all but turned the craft upside down. Besides, she was in danger of driving onto the ledges at any time, and though sleet and snow cut into their faces like knives, not a man could leave the deck. The schooner sprang a leak and water was pouring in at over 200 strokes an hour. Later part of the deckload of lumber was swept away. It was necessary to put the vessel under short canvas to prevent her becoming waterlogged, for whenever the sail was increased her leach started up alarmingly at a corresponding rate.—Boston Journal.

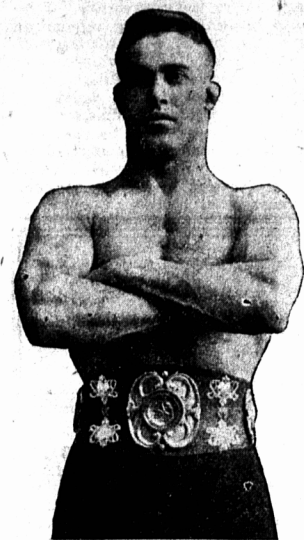
