B. contains an excellent engraving of the Electric Power House of that town over which James Waddell formerly of this city is superintendent. The building is described as an imposing one of French Fort Quarry sandstone. The power house is really two separate buildings with an oil for boilers and fuel storage room. One of these buildings is for the large pump which pumps the water to a large storage reservoir on the hill above the town. Sufficient space has been allowed in case it becomes necessary to install a duplicate pump. The other building is the electric light station. There are placed the engine and dynamo, with the other necessary machinery for developing electricity. In this department also space has been reserved for duplicating the plant if it should at any time be found necessary to install same. All the machinery is of the best, and expense was not spared to procure that which would give the most satisfaction.
