KILAND, N. B., Nov. 13.—A fourteen year old girl, Dorothy Scott was accidentally shot and killed here yesterday when several children of the Scott family, while their parents were away undertook to play with a loaded shotgun. The shooting occurred while the girl's mother was at church and her father at a distant part of the farm. The victim, fatally wounded in the shoulder, walked from the barnyard where the accident occurred, to a bedroom and collapsed, her lifeless body being discovered by a brother, David Scott, on returning from church.
