

MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY.

At Charlottetown and within St. James' Hall there on Tuesday, May 26th and at eleven o'clock a. m. which date and place the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met and was constituted, Mr. G. Miller, Moderator, with whom were present Messrs. D. B. McLeod, Craise and Fullerton, ministers, and Messrs. J. J. McLeod and T. C. James, elders. After reading correspondence, the clerk reported that he had cited the congregation of West and Clyde Rivers to appear at this meeting for their interests, in connection with the resignation of J. G. MacIver. Mr. A. Wright, representing West River section, spoke of the deep attachment of the congregation to their pastor, and of their regret at his resignation. Mr. MacIver adhering to his resignation, it was on motion accepted to take effect on and after the last day of May. Mr. T. F. Fullerton was appointed interim moderator of session, and instructed to have the pulpit declared vacant as speedily thereafter as possible. On motion the clerk was instructed to apply to the Home Mission Committee for the sum of eight dollars for R. P. Murray for supply in the congregation of Tryon and Bonshaw, being at the rate of four dollars per Sabbath. On motion Mr. T. F. Fullerton was appointed to represent the Presbytery at the meeting of the Church and Mansie Building Fund, at St. John, N. B., on Thursday next. The moderator reported that he had moderated in a call in the congregation of Tryon and Bonshaw on Tuesday May nineteenth, that it came out unanimously and enthusiastically in favor of Mr. M. H. MacIntosh, that it was signed by ninety communicants and sixty two adherents, and that it was accompanied by a guarantee for four hundred and fifty dollars and a manse. On motion the conduct of the Moderator was sustained and the commissioners, Messrs. McLeod, Shaw and Harvie heard. They all testified to the unanimity and heartyness of the call, and to the strong desire of the whole congregation to secure Mr. MacIntosh's services. On motion the call was sustained as a regular Gospel call, and put into Mr. MacIntosh's hands. Mr. Fullerton spoke of the earnest wishes of the whole Presbytery that if possible, Mr. MacIntosh should accept the call. Mr. MacIntosh, however, felt it his duty to decline, and the Presbytery in consequence, set aside the call and in doing so expressed their high appreciation of the worthy effort made by the congregation to secure a settled pastor, their deep sympathy with them in their failure, and their earnest hope that they may speedily be successful in securing a suitable settlement. The Presbytery then adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator and Clerk, of which public intimation was made and this sedent closed with the benediction.—T. C. JAMES, Clerk.
