## Stabilization Fund Goes Into Operation

### Live Lobster Shipments Up

MONCTON, June 5.—According to Canadian National Express Company officials there has been a 25 percent increase in shipments of live lobsters from Northumberland Straits points to the New England market. ## Difference In Exchange Value On Agricultural And Fishery Products To Be Paid.

OTTAWA, June 5.—The agricultural stabilization fund, announced in the budget speech of the Minister of Finance, has been put into operation under regulations approved by the Governor in council and announced today by Sir George Perley, Acting Prime Minister.

Under the plan, exporters of certain Canadian products to the United Kingdom will be paid the difference between the amount of the proceeds of their sales at the current rate of exchange and what would have been realized at a stabilized rate of \$4.60. The list of commodities to which the fund applies is limited to those mentioned in the budget announcement viz., cattle, meats, poultry, fresh fish, canned fish, tobacco, cheese, milk products, canned fruits, canned vegetables, maple products, eggs and honey. In the regulations, these goods are more specifically defined. Except for cattle, poultry or meats, the approved commodities must have been, in their primary form, the product of the 1933 crop of producing or fishing season. Only commodities produced and prepared in Canada are eligible.

The fund applies to goods entered for export to the United Kingdom on or after May 1st, 1933.

The administration will be under the Department of Finance. The procedure will be that applications for payments from the fund will be received by the department from the exporter, who will be required to establish, under oath and by production of documents, all necessary details of the transactions. ## STRIKE IS TEMPORARILY AVERTED

### Nova Scotia Miners Will Remain On Job Until Strike Vote Is Taken.

GLACE BAY, N. S., June 5.—Threat of a strike temporarily averted, Nova Scotia's coal mines were operating as usual tonight. Cancellation of strike call for midnight last night will keep the amalgamated mine workers' membership on the job for at least a week. A strike vote will be taken in the meantime.

The Union's district executive had ordered the strike in sympathy with the colliers of Florence and Princess Pitts, who are faced with wage reductions of 25 per cent. An appeal for support was ignored by the United Mine Workers, the older and officially recognized union.

Members of the opposing union clashed at Bras D'or last night when A. M. W. Picket sought to bar U. M. W. men from entering Colonial mine. A few bruises were distributed as the U. M. W. men forced their way into the colliery.

Tonight, all was quiet in the mining districts, as the executive of the new union prepared for the referendum among its membership on the strike question. The vote will be recorded this week.

## Spanish Prince To Renounce All Claims To Throne

### Prince Declares He Intends To Cast Aside All His Royal Claims And Marry For Love — Father Objects.

FONTAINEBLEU, France, June 5.—When the Prince of the Asturias married his Cuban fiancee, Senorita Edelmira Sampedro in Lausanne, he will, in effect, renounce his claims to the Spanish throne.

Official notice of "promise of marriage" was posted in the City Hall of Lausanne today and court circles here declared that although the Prince has not formally renounced his claims, his marriage to the Cuban girl would amount to the same thing.

### Former King Unhappy

Nor will his father, former King Alfonso, attend the wedding ceremonies. The King is visiting in Venice but his spokesman here said "the King is not happy about the marriage and will not go to the wedding." It was understood, however, that the Prince's mother, Queen Victoria, will attend.

### Fire Destroys Dwelling Near Kensington

Fire yesterday afternoon destroyed the fine farm residence of Stanley Caseley, situated on the Irish-town Road about 1 1/2 miles East of Kensington.

The ringing of the Kensington fire bell summoned many helpers to the scene, but they were unable to save the dwelling. Through their efforts, however, the outer buildings were saved.

The cause of the fire is unknown. The estimated cost of the dwelling was not revealed.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., June 5.—The saw mill of Fraser Companies, Limited, at Atholville, closed for the last four or five years, will be reopened immediately to saw 8,000,000 feet of logs, Premier L. P. D. Tilley announced today. In addition the Fraser Companies will require 16,000 cords of pulpwood, much of which, it is understood, will be purchased and cut along the Miramichi River.

### Wants Citizenship

The Prince, it is understood, already has applied to the Spanish Government for papers to give him the status of "simple citizen." Friends quote him as saying "let Juan have the throne. I love her (Senorita Sampedro) and want to marry her. That's where real happiness lies."

Senorita Sampedro is the daughter of a wealthy Cuban merchant, now dead. She lives with her mother and sisters at Lausanne. The notice at Lausanne gave her name as Nocejo Adelmira Ignacia Sampedro and the Prince's as Don Alfonso Pio Cristiano Eduardo Francisco Guillermo Carlos Enrique Eugenio Antonino Venancio de Borbon y Battenberg.

### Police Believe Men Were Given Outside Assistance In Break.

While somewhat reluctant to discuss details of the break police today stated they are now convinced the two men had outside assistance in carrying out a pre-arranged plan.

## Farm Hand Is Held On Brutal Murder Charge

### Hired Man Disappears After Brutally Beating Employer.

YORKTON, Sask., June 5.—A charge of murder tonight was laid against Henry Suppes, 30-year-old farm-hand as a coroner adjourned an inquest into the death of Gus Stebner, farmer of the Rhein district. Stebner was beaten into insensibility as he sat nursing a baby on the steps of his farm home 12 miles north of here. Suppes will appear for preliminary hearing June 13.

According to police Stebner had reprimanded Suppes for ill-treating farm horses. The hired man, who disappeared shortly after the attack was taken into custody at the nearby village. Stebner was beaten down on Sunday with a heavy farm hammer. His wife found his unconscious form slumped over the infant. Rescuing the baby she hurried to a neighbor's and notified the police.

### Breach Between The President And Congress May Prolong Session.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—A widening breach between President Roosevelt and the United States Congress over veterans allowances threatened today to tear asunder the administration's legislative programme and indefinitely prolong the extra session of Congress.

### Snowden Favors Payment Of Debts

LONDON, June 6.—(Tuesday)—Viscount Snowden of Ickornshaw, twice Chancellor of the British Exchequer, has thrown the weight of his authority in financial matters on the side of paying the June debt installment to the United States, but of paying it in silver.

In a special article in the Daily Mail today he discusses the pros and cons of paying the \$75,950,000, all interest, which falls due June 15. While contending "there is a strong moral case for complete relief from the American debt," Viscount Snowden maintains that "on the whole, the weight of argument heavily favors making the payment."

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## CONGRESS DISPUTES LEGISLATION

## Guthrie On Return Home

OTTAWA, June 5.—Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Minister of Justice, who has been absent over two months in England and the Continent, will return to Ottawa late this week. He will land at Quebec Thursday, passing in mid-ocean the steamer carrying Prime Minister R. B. Bennett and the Canadian Delegation to the World Economic and Monetary Conference. It had been expected Mr. Guthrie would remain abroad and join the Canadian delegation in London.

## Austro-Vatican Concordat Is Signed

VATICAN CITY, June 5.—(A.P.)—A new Austro-Vatican concordat was signed today.

Chancellor Engelbert Dollfuss and Minister of Justice Kurt Schussnigg signed the document for the Austrian Government and Cardinal Pacelli, Papal Secretary of State, on behalf of the Vatican.

## Plane Is Identified

BELFAST, Northern Ireland, June 5.—(A.P.)—The aeroplane which flew yesterday over Kerry and was at first believed that of James Mattern, world flyer, was identified today as an army plane searching for Irish Republican army gun runners. Strictest secrecy surrounds the result of the search.

## U. S. Delegation To Suggest Flat Cut In Tariffs

S. S. PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT AT SEA, June 5.—A flat 10 per cent cut in all nations' tariffs was disclosed officially today by the United States delegation as an idea being strongly pushed for action at the forthcoming World Economic Conference in London. A spokesman for the group heading for the British capital aboard this ship expressed the belief that such a reduction would be proposed and achieved at the Conference opening a week from today. If this alone resulted in the tariff field, he said, the Conference would not be a failure.
