This structure insulated and frost-proof throughout is one hundred and twenty feet by forty feet and can house between forty-five and fifty car loads of potatoes. It is constructed of the finest lumber available and this lumber was all secured locally, the outside is covered with fire-proof shingles. Mr. Morrissey pointed out the wonderful advantage this potato house will be to the farmer who in the past was unable to store his complete crop of potatoes and suffered a severe loss when having

to sacrifice the surplus for a very small price before the cold weather set in. This building has its electric plant, supplying its own lighting and pumping system. For the evening of the grand opening a kitchen and lunch counter was set up inside the building and the members of the Tignish Catholic Women's League served lunches and tea. Canteen service was also supplied. The Manager directors and shareholders of the Tignish Co-operative with the executive of the Tignish Fire Department and the Tignish Catholic Women's League all worked together and are most grateful to Mr. Messer and his musicians for their fine music and to all who attended the dance and others who helped in any manner in making this evening the grand success it was both socially and financially. 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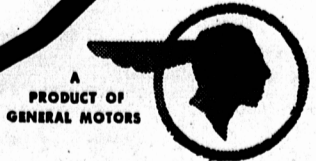
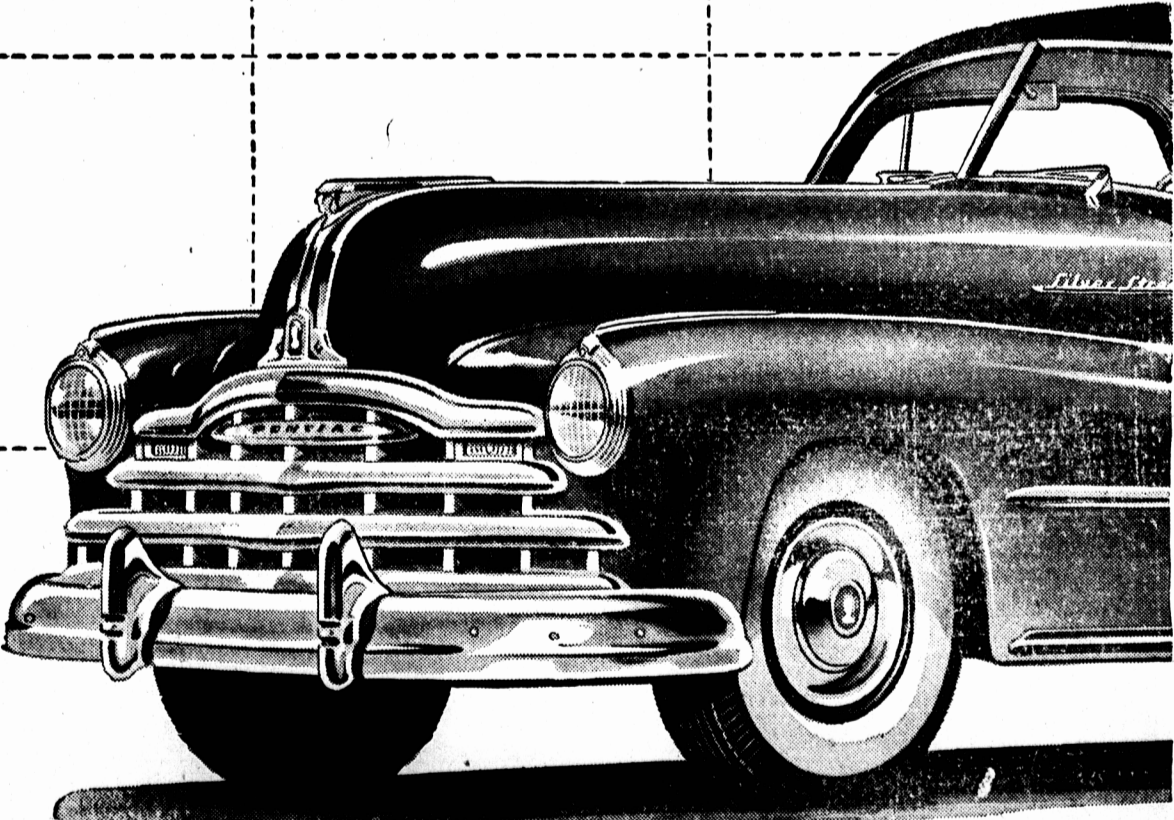
