(Continued From the Third Page.)

In the evening we removed back to the...

Tuesday, 20th—Up at daylight; breakfasted, and moved forward to relieve the regiments in the front lines.

Wednesday, 21st.—After breakfast we moved half a mile for a much needed rest.

Thursday 22nd.—Boer reinforcements departed in the distance and we had to secure the strongest positions in sight.

Friday, 23rd—Most disagreeable rained nearly all day, and although every one and every-

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Saturday 24th—Rained through the night and every man was wet through.

Sunday 25th.—Rested some. Two of our men secured a lamb, which served as an extra, and as there are twenty of the two maxim guns, we mostly have a better chance to rustle for extras than the men in the ranks.

Monday, 26th—Moved to the front, relieving the Cornwalls in the trenches, and here the Canadians again put some fine work. Their shooting was very effective.

Tuesday, 27th—"The anniversary of Ajuba Hill!" and the Gordons and Canadians "exceeded themselves," the two regiments forcing the Boers back, blowing them to their trenches.

It appears that when the order was given to charge so as to secure new ground for trenches, "G" Company (in which are the Islanders) went about 40 yards too far and were ordered to lie down.

In the afternoon Lord Roberts addressed the Canadians, complimenting them on their "valor and the splendid character of the work performed by them all through the engagement."

After all the prisoners were removed soldiers were given free scope over the Boer laager and "may be they didn't do a thing to it!" There was, however, a quantity of flour and meal around and they were the most welcome articles at the time.

We are now encamped above the river, where we will probably remain for the next move, which, I think, will be towards Bloemfontein.

Bold Escape from Pretoria.

LONDON, April 4.—The despatch from Lorenzo Marques, dated yesterday, announcing the arrival there of Captain Haldane, of the Gordon Highlanders, and Lieut. Le Mesurier, of the Dublin Fusiliers, who made their escape from Pretoria, is followed to-day by further details of their perilous adventures after getting over the railings and reaching the street.

"The moon was full," continues the narrative, "and our untidy appearance attracted the attention of the police, but we managed to clear the town and to strike the Delagoa Bay Railroad.

"We followed the line, hiding by day in ditches. Many narrow escapes we had from the Boer patrols. In one instance we were compelled to make to the river and swim some distance, after having alarmed a patrol which was searching for us along the banks, we spent a miserable night in a clump of bracken.

"The morning sun brought life to our chilled bodies, but found our small supplies of meat lozenges and chocolate had been melted by the water, with the exception of one tin of army emergency ration.

"When night came on we left the railway track as being too risky, and wandered far to the southward, only striking the railway again at Elands river near day-break. We were so tired that we were obliged to rest at the first available cover, which proved to be in the centre of a Boer farm.

Again we had a narrow escape from discovery by the farm hands, but we got safely away at nightfall, proceeding a short distance. All the following day we lay in an ant-bear hole, under the boiling sun."

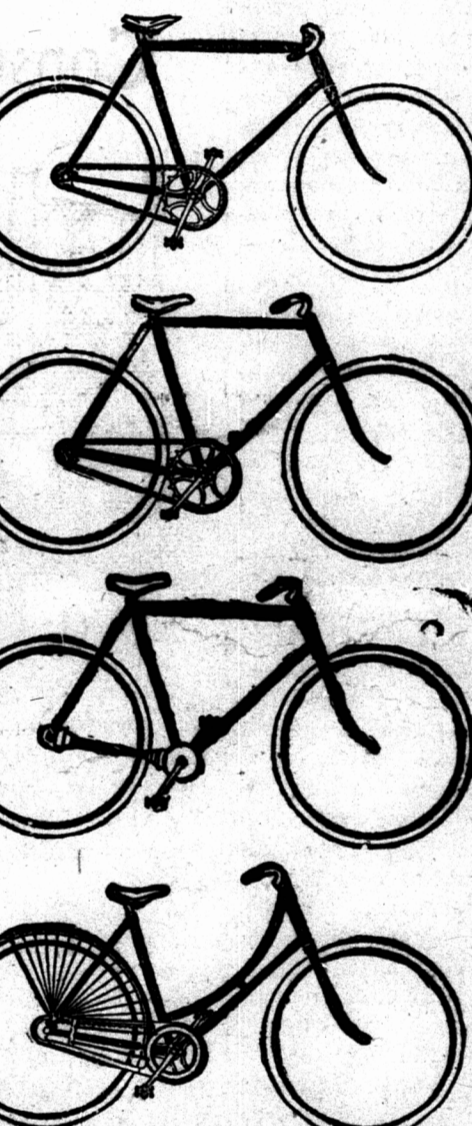
