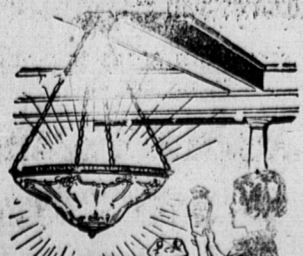

to their pledges to the people and  
to insist upon them implementing  
their promises. This we are asking  
them to do or relinquish their false-  
ly acquired trust.

Of all amusing episodes the latest  
in the MacKenzie King vaudeville  
is the most amusing. Starting out  
on his last summer campaign he  
told his followers that he would  
have "one story only," and "not  
one story for the East and a differ-  
ent one for the West." Since then  
his course and his conduct has been  
crystallized into history. Wherever  
he spoke he had a policy, designed  
as finely as he could create it to  
satisfy the local conditions of those  
whom he addressed. Almost every  
feature of tariff policy at some  
place and in some form received his  
approval. To the western Farmers  
particularly he discovered that his  
fiscal policy was almost identical  
with theirs. When he reached the  
manufacturing centres of Ontario  
he developed into quite a strong  
tariff for revenue man. But the rub  
came when he was up against it in  
Quebec. His teachings and preach-  
ings had preceded him, and the  
murmuring and the black looks of  
those whom he formerly esteemed  
as staunch upholders of the Lib-  
eral banner gave him the sensation  
of chills in his back-bone.

His difficulty came thus-wisely. At  
the banquet to Sir Dummer Goulet  
he was booked to speak. He had learned  
of the defection in the province  
against his party because of the  
leanings of the people toward Pro-  
tection, and he dare not repeat the  
stories he preached out west. So he  
rounded up instead with his newest  
expedient, which in brief is for the  
people to elect him and his party  
to power, and when they get into
