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Yanks Defeat Dodgers In Q.S.S. League

In a Queen Square School league baseball game played yesterday afternoon, Yankees defeated the Dodgers 9-7. Red Sox and Dodgers were slated to oppose each other but a last minute change brought Yanks and Dodgers together for the second time this season.

Features of the game were Sonny Stull's four base wallop, the first of the season and the hurling of Joe Coyle and Gump Gillis. Stull's clout came with a man on base; he also started on the mound for the losers but retired after one and a third innings after being nicked for eight runs on three hits and six passed batsmen.

Joe Coyle took over then and pitched four-hit ball for the remainder of the game. Coyle pitched 4 2/3 innings, allowing one run, four hits, walking two and striking out seven.

But it was Gump Gillis who pitched the better game as he earned his second victory of the season. Gillis walked seven runs, four hits, allowed five and struck out nine batters.

Stull, Frank Zakem and a rookie, George Bradley, who played a great game, each had two hits to lead the batters.
