MYSTERY PORT WILL NOW BE EXCAVATED

LONDON Aug 30.—The Commissioners of the Office of Works have given permission to the Society of Antiquaries to excavate Richborough, the "mystery" port of the war, and digging will begin early next month. It will be the most important attempt ever made to throw light on those far off, dim days when the legions of Rome ruled Britain. The work will take five years to complete.

Few people know that Richborough, in addition to its mystery as the "hush" port of the war, holds a mystery which is nearly 2,000 years old, and is one of the most puzzling problems in Romano-British archaeology. It was inhabited throughout the 400 years of the Roman occupation, and town after town was built on its site. Here the legions landed, and more than 140,000 Roman coins have been discovered in the neighborhood—possibly the "back pay" of the troops!

The thousands of visitors who are at present visiting Richborough are immediately impressed by the sharp contrast between the up-to-date port which grew up during the war and the ragged old ruins of Richborough Castle, composed of time defying pink Roman mortar and stone, which is all that is left of the once famous port of Rutuplae.

One of the romances of the war was the wizard-like transformation of the barren marsh to a great base for transport, a depot for troops, and a dock. It was a remarkable instance of military history repeating itself. The Romans discovered that Richborough was a key to Britain, and after a lapse of nearly two thousand years the Army Council made it a key to France.

The ancient mystery of Richborough is to be found within the tough old walls of the castle. Near the north-eastern corner a rise rises in the form of a cross. This is the mark of a superstructure which has entirely disappeared. Beneath this cross is a solid rectangular platform 144 ft. long and 104 ft. wide, and of unknown depth. Many attempts have been made to find out how deep this great platform goes down in the earth, but none has been successful.

An additional touch of mystery was given to this foundation some years ago when a number of excavators discovered a long and irregular subterranean passage which may today be explored by the aid of candles.

What was this platform and its underground passage? Nothing like it has ever been discovered among the Roman remains in this country or on the Continent.

OTTAWA, Aug 28.—Dominion notes outstanding on July 31, against deposits of approved securities, under the finance act, totalled \$108,750,824.56, according to the monthly statement on circulation and specie issued today by the department of finance. Gold held for redemption of Dominion notes totalled \$87,053,336.54. Savings bank deposits at the end of the month totalled \$33,052,975.63, of which a gold reserve was held of \$3,305,295.77. Gold held by the minister of finance at the end of July totalled \$90,358,632.31.

A recent report from the Record of Performance division gives Prince Edward Island the distinction of having a cow in her four year old form which not only leads her class but also leads the mature class for the period given.

Tals cow Dinora 4th 48842 was one of the heifers imported by the Hillshoro Consolidated Club in their initial importation. Dinora 4th with two of her paternal sisters was purchased from Cohor Brothers of Burgessville, Ont. The Messrs. Cohor guaranteed good breeding but had never done any official work. Two of these namely Cynthia Abbekirk, R. O. M. 2488 butter and Dinora 4th R. O. P. 23294 pounds of milk and 958.75 pounds of butter have made a reputation for their breeders and the men who developed them, namely H. J. Kennedy of Clearview Farm, Southport, P. E. I., and Alex M. Agnew, of Craig-alee Farm, Charlottetown. Royalty present owner of Dinora 4th. Dinora has developed from an ordinary sized two year old heifer to a cow of today, weighing well over seven hundred pounds and barring accidents we expect to see her going beyond the thirty thousand pound mark during her next lactation period. Below will be found a sketch of her breeding.

Dinora 4th, 48842 daughter of Mercena Triton Abbekirk 17993 with two recorded daughters whose mother Mercena Scouling had a R. O. M. of 2256 pounds butter and has three daughters with good records including Mercena, Scouling 6th with 26.04. She also has five proven sons Mercena Triton, Abbekerk's sire. Ina Triton 2nds Abbekerk has one qualified daughter and one proven son and is himself a son of Prince Abbekerk Pauline 2755 with 19 qualified daughters and 9 proven sons, including the noted Madam Posca Pauline whose R. O. M. is 34.28 pounds butter and Rosaline with 30.78 pounds. Prince Abbekerk Pauline in turn is a son of Prince Pauline Dekol who has 15 qualified daughters and 13 proven sons.

On her dam's side Dinora 4th is a daughter of Dinora 15549 herself a daughter of Count Canary 5549 with 4 recorded daughters with records of junior 2 year olds of 16.17 pounds butter to 24.77 pounds butter as mature cows. Count Canary's sire Daisy Dikot Boy nas 4 qualified daughters and 4 proven sons while his dam Dekol Jewel 2nd is sized by Count Cornelius 3144 with 4 qualified daughters including Aggie Mercedes 7667 with 29.19 pounds butter in seven days. She also has four proven sons.

Although Dinora 4th breeders did not do any official listing they knew what they were doing and always bred to a sire with something behind him thus exemplifying that she is no freak but bred along producing lines.

To Mr. Agnew and Craig-alee we offer our congratulations on his success and only hope he may follow on in his noble work. This is the young man's age and we are willing to take off our hats to them.

This section of our fair province seems to be suited to the developing of dairy wonders for besides producing Dinora 4th's 23294 pounds for the Holsteens the adjoining farm Fairvue is where Messrs. MacRae and Sons developed Milkmaid 7th world's record of 11672 pounds at 2 years for the Ayrshires.

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
