**Berlin Bans "All Quiet On The Western Front"**

THE MOVIE VERSION DWELLS TOO MUCH ON GERMAN DEFEAT TO SUIT FATHERLAND.

BERLIN, Dec. 11.—A movie version of Germany's part in the war, based on a book written by a German, was banned from the screens of the Fatherland today.

Following six days of riotous protests by Fascists against the filming of Erich Maria Remarque's novel, "All quiet on the western front," the Supreme Film Board forbade further showing of the picture in Germany.

In an announcement the Board said the film dwelt too much on Germany defeated, painted a false picture of the German soldier, and "endangers German prestige abroad."

The action was taken after the United States producers had informed the censors that, regarding of the Board's finding, the film would be withdrawn. The Board insisted this had nothing to do with its decision.

**Further Hearings Scheduled For The Maritimes**

QUEBEC, Dec. 11.—Hearing of the Quebec case for inclusion in the "select territory" under the provisions of the Maritime Freight Rates Act was resumed and concluded today when the Board of Railway Commissioners of Canada heard further evidence why Quebec should be granted the same freight rates between here and the Maritimes as Levis, just across the St. Lawrence river from Quebec.

Levis also presented testimony showing why it alone should enjoy the preferential privileges. Commissioner Thomas Vien presided over the hearing, with Commissioner J. Stoneman also on the bench.

Other hearings will take place in Halifax and Saint John before the Board will sit in Montreal. Final arguments will be heard in Ottawa.

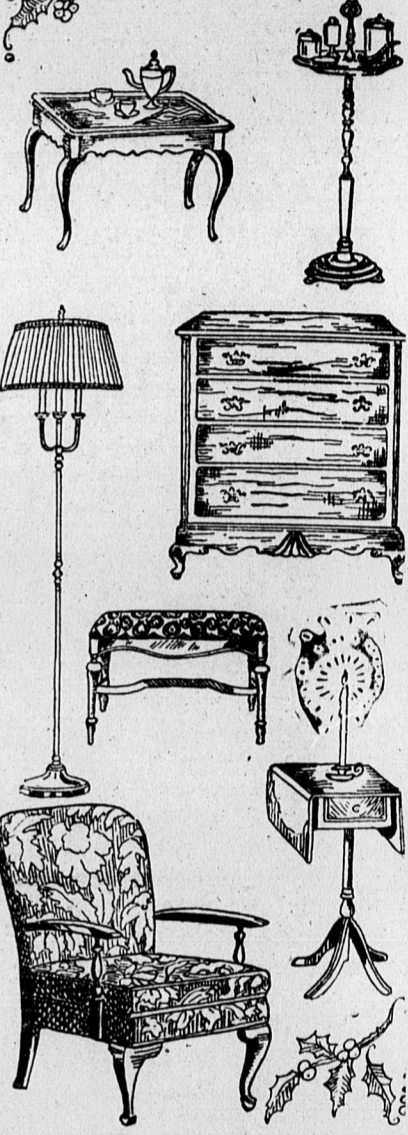

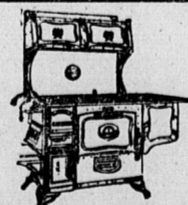
