McKNIGHT - VATICAN CITY, Feb. 13 (AP) - Pope Pius XII today made a plea to the great powers, particularly the United States, to use their influence to bring about a cessation of hostilities in the Pacific and to support the efforts of the United Nations to bring about a general armistice.

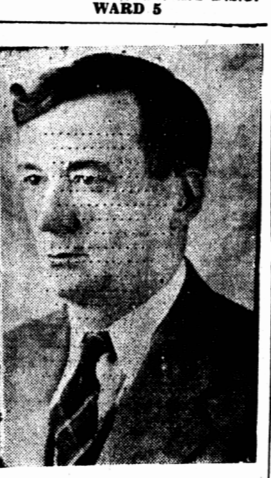

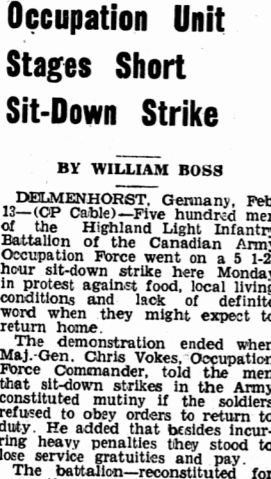

Plan For National Theatre In London

LONDON, Feb. 13 (CP) - A £500,000 campaign will soon be launched to build a National Theatre in London, fulfilling a 37-year effort to establish an Empire drama centre.

This ambitious project was brought closer by a merger of the Shakespeare Memorial National Theatre Committee, original exponent of the idea, and the Old Vic company, which has functioned through the war although bombed out of their London headquarters.

The plays to be performed will not be confined to those of Shakespeare.

Pending formal amalgamation of the National Theatre under royal charter, the S. M. N. T. C. and Old Vic organizations have agreed to merge their forces.

In Memoriam

MR. AMBROSE BARRY

The people of Morell Village, together with numerous friends and relatives of the deceased, received with a feeling of sincere regret the sad news that Mr. Ambrose Barry, one of the oldest and most highly esteemed residents of Morell, was called from this world on Monday, January 14th, 1946.

The late Mr. Barry was born at Morell eighty-four years ago, being the son of Daniel Barry and Anna Willock and spent practically all his life in the village where he was admitted and loved by young and old alike. He was possessed of a rare charm of manner and an extraordinarily even temperament, which were prominent at all times in his social and business dealings, but which were especially evident in the beautiful domestic life which he shared with his beloved wife, the former Georgina Currie of Nine Mile Creek, who devotedly cared for him during a rather lengthy affliction, and who was constantly at his bedside during his final illness. She will surely miss his beloved presence, particularly so as she has not the comfort of a family, no children having blessed their union. She is his only immediate surviving relative.

There is surely a model Christian marital life and it can in truth be said that Mr. Barry was a faithful imitator of the husband in that humble home in Nazareth, who was ever ready and willing to sacrifice self-interest to carry out God's will in all things, so long as he was the protector of his seeking employment in their profession. At present, Miss Hall informed her audience, there were about 1000 registered nurses in Canada. Those nurses, Miss Hall said, were also of value to hospitals seeking the services of trained nurses.

For the past six years the deceased was afflicted with blindness, a cross which he bore with heroic fortitude and a ready acceptance to God's Holy Will which was marked and an inspiration to all who had the privilege of visiting and conversing with him. Never once did his own personal grievance or the fact that he should be compelled to perform the rather arduous duties about their home which had always been his responsibility. When any chance remark was made regarding his illness his reply was ever the same: "Thank God it's not something much worse."

A visit with him was a beautiful lesson in patience and forbearance; his cheerfulness could not fail to impress both friend and stranger. He was always keenly interested in current affairs, an interest which never waned and as upon his final illness he was an intelligent conversationalist.

Mr. Barry spent his working years in the fishing business, being foreman of a lobster factory for several years, after which he engaged in business for himself which he was quite successful. He will be remembered by his business associates as being honest and upright in all his transactions, and fair to all.

Being an exemplary Catholic he manifested at all times zealous devotion, and his religious habits might well inspire anyone to higher ideals and to live a truly beautiful Christian life. His example will undoubtedly inculcate in others a greater spirit of unity and devotion to the sacraments and the duties of his profession. He was a man of deep faith and a true believer in the resurrection of the body.

His funeral took place Wednesday morning, January 16, from his late residence, to the Church of the Little Flower, and was held at 10 o'clock. A requiem mass was sung by Fr. MacKeeney, who also conducted the service at the grave, where all that was mortal of a loving husband, a kind friend and an obliging neighbor, was laid to rest to await the final resurrection.

When this church was erected some years ago Mr. Barry gave fully of his time and finances, asking only as his reward that he might be of the greatest possible assistance to the then much loved pastor, the late Rev. Joseph Rooney, and that he might promote this holy work to the best of his ability.
